TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Jamaica, April 2nd—The Hon. Edwin Denby, Secretary of the U. S. Navy and party of Senators, naval officers, newspaper and moving picture men, arrived at Kingston on Wednesday afternoon on the U. S.S. Henderson on their way from Panama, where they witnessed the war manoeuvres of the American battle fleet, which included an "attack" on the canal and the sinking of the battleship Iowa. As the party arrived at Kingston later than expected, the arrangements made by the entertainment committee to take the party for various motor trips had to be cancelled. The programme was confirmed to an "at home" at King's House and dance at Myrtle Bank Hotel that afternoon and on Thursday they crossed the island to Port Antonio where they were entertained by the managers of the United Fruit Co. and the Atlantic Fruit Co. All expressed themselves as delighted with the hospitality extended and the beautiful scenery.

Halifax, N. S., March 29th—West India matters were the principal topics before the Council of the Board of Trade at its regular weekly session yesterday afternoon with the President, Colonel Montgomerie, in the chair. The Canada West India Steamship Service was the principal topic and was brought to the attention of the council by a letter stating some pressure may be brought about whereby a change in the present condition may take place, and as it was the unanimous opinion that the Board should urge upon the Federal Government
