ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Aug. 30th.—The Albanian Minister in Paris has written to M. Poincaré, President of the Ambassadors' Council, expressing Albania's deepest regret at the tragic death of General Tellini. He considers the loss of "this loyal and just man, who by his rare qualities had inspired the respect and confidence of all," in the light of a national misfortune.

Paris, Aug. 30th.—A despatch from Turin to the Petit Parisien says that although the strictest orders have been given to the Italian press not to divulge military news, it is understood here that the Italian fleet has been ordered to concentrate at Taranto, Italy. If the Greek Government accepts Italy's ultimatum, only one division of the Italian fleet will go to Piræus, the despatch says.

Shanghai, Sept. 2nd.—One hundred thousand Japanese perished in the Yokohama fire of yesterday.

London, Aug. 31st.—The Italians have occupied Corfu in Greece, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Athens tonight. The Italian Legation at Athens, adds the despatch, handed the Greek Foreign Minister a note announcing that the Italians had occupied Corfu at 4 o'clock. The Legation further notified the Greek Government that at 5 o'clock an ultimatum, giving only five hours' grace to Greece, would be handed the Greek Foreign Minister. At that hour, however, the occupation, which is peaceful and only temporary, had already taken place. Great indignation was provoked.

London, Aug. 31st.—The Italian Em-

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bassy this afternoon emphatically denied that Italy had declared war on Greece.

London, Aug. 31st.—Martial law was proclaimed throughout Greece today, says an Athen despatch to the Central News.

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
