TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Sept. 29th. Through the further reduction of half a cent by the Federal Sugar Refining Company today, the price of granulated sugar dropped to 13½ cents a pound. This was the lowest price since the Govt. relinquished control and about 12 cents per pound less than the high level prevailing in the sugar market.

Dublin, Sept. 29th.—The suggestions for the solution of the Irish problem which are actually an offer of a generous form of Home Rule made by Viscount Grey have attracted much attention in this City, but public opinion generally discounts the probability of their adoption. Moderate elements approve of the Viscounts plan but Sinn Fein, it is said, would not consent to an assembly for constituting a future government unless the law gave automatic force to whatever decisions are reached. Under such conditions on the other hand Ulster would refuse to enter. Sinn Fein quarters welcome the proposal but if a settlement is not reached within two years the British Govt. should withdraw altogether leaving responsibility to the Irish people. Leaders of the Sinn Fein movement say that all they ask is free responsibility.

London, Sept. 30th.—Alderman James Rold yesterday was elected Lord Mayor of London by the Court of Aldermen with all the ancient picturesque ceremonies. He will take up office on November 9th, succeeding Sir Edward Cooper.

Paris, Sept. 29th.—Wolhelm Mayer Von Kaufheren the German Ambassador to France has presented his credentials to President Millerand at the Elysee Pal-

ace thus restoring diplomatic relations between France and Germany.

New York, Sept. 30th.—The largest shipment of gold \$16, 750,000 ever transported across the Atlantic is being brought to New York on the White Star Liner "Baltic" which left Liverpool on September 22nd it was reported here yesterday. The gold is consigned to United States bankers. The largest previous shipment from abroad of which there is any known record was approximately \$8,000,000.

London, Sept. 30th.—Following is the result of the Jockey Club stakes run at New Market today: 1st Torelore, 2nd Orpheus, 3rd Celestial.

New York, Sept. 30th.—A heavy windstorm which struck New York tonight tore down telegraph and telephone wires, flooded streets, uprooted trees and broke many plate-glass windows. No one was injured. The storm was responsible for several thousands of dollars damage in the Times Square district, where many plate-glass shop-fronts were broken.
