"HIS WIFE'S MONEY"

Appropriate theme is that of "His Wife's Money" at a time when domestic relations are being more strained than ever on economic questions. It also shows up the all-too-common selfishness of married women well off in their own right. There are male creatures who do not hesitate to sacrifice personal honor and dignity of character in order to live on wealthy wives, but they are not objects of admiration, even when they are socially tolerated. The genuine man, as impersonated by Eugene O'Brien, cannot disregard his protective instincts and happily subsist on "His Wife's Money." It is deep in his nature to go to the front where the fighting is hardest and do his share in the general struggle, hence he revolts at being a camp follower in his own family.

Such is the essence of the Selznick story. Its mood is fully appreciated by Eugene O'Brien and Zeena Keefe as the wife. Their performances are the more creditable in that they are of difficult characterization. Their highly intelligent interpretations of the leading roles and the vitality of the theme make "His Wife's Money" a satisfactory product and a good entertainment.

respective Governments. refused to make public the text of the agreement. They insist that while they may have lost their point, Turkey has agreed to compensation safeguards which makes the settlement a compromise. The Turks say their only concession was an agreement to notify the advisers of arrests, but they remark that there is a distinct provision that the advisers must not seek to interfere with trials. Advisers will be appointed to hold office for five years to replace the old consular courts and judicial capitulations. The proposed Franco-Turk conversation regarding the French railway concession in Anatolia will be private.

Moscow, May 30th.—The appearance near the Murkansk coast of two British cruisers, a gunboat and several armed trawlers is reported by the Moscow newspapers, which comment upon the possible significance of the warships coming. It is reported that Lord Curzon is still

insisting upon the withdrawal of the Russian representative from Persia.

London, May 31st.—A British memorandum dealing with Russia's last reply to Lord Curzon's note was communicated to Leonid Krassin, the Bolshevik representative here, yesterday, according to the Daily Herald. It accepts with slight reservations Russia's offer regarding the payment of compensation for the seizure of British trawlers and for the execution of Chas F. Davison and the arrests and detention of Mrs. Harding, a newspaper correspondent, and for the withdrawal of the two Weinstein notes written in reply to the British protest over the prosecution of church officials, which notes Great Britain considered offensive. It is asserted that the memorandum also tacitly abandons the charge that the Soviet is financing British communists, but declares the Russian reply with respect to Russian propaganda in Asia is unsatisfactory and demands that the

Russian representatives in Teheran and Kabul shall be withdrawn. According to the Daily Herald, the memorandum affirms Great Britain's willingness to take the initiative in calling an International Conference to settle the question of the extent of territorial waters.

Melilla Morocco, May 30th.—The Spanish troops have lost 127 men killed and wounded in defending their position at Tizzazza against an attack by the Briorigel tribesmen. The tribesmen had 500 casualties, the rebels were endeavouring to cut off the Spanish force from the main army, but were repulsed.

Berlin, May 30th.—The council of the Reich has adopted the budget for 1923 as passed by the Reichstag. The budget shows a deficit of 124,000,000,000, 000 marks.

Shanghai, May 30th.—Major Robert Allen, of the United States army and W. Smith, of Manchester England, who were captured by the bandits on May 6th have been released, according to advices received here today.

Brussels, May 30th.—Randolph Lycett of Great Britain, defeated George Watson of Belgium, in the opening singles match of the Davis cup lawn tennis elimination on the Leopold Club courts here today, 6-2 8-6, 6-2.

London, May 31st.—In the second innings of the match played between Hampshire and the West Indian team, Hampshire declared at 252 for eight wickets and the West Indians replied with 139. In the Bowling of the West Indians, Francis took two wickets 58, Browne three for 60, Challenor two for 17, Constantine one for 35. The following are the individual scores, Nunes 31 Holt O Challenor 28 Ince 7 Tarilton 27 Fernandes 2 Browne 8 Constantine 10 Pa-call (not out) 12 Dewhurst O Francis 12 extras 2 total 139.

Toronto Ont., May 30th.—A special despatch this evening to the Evening Telegraph states that the country around White River and Chapleau is ablaze with fire, fanned by a northwest breeze, is swept into the settlement. The despatch states that millions of dollars worth of timber is being consumed. Representatives are being made, it is stated, by railway and timber interests for emergency aid to prevent the spread of the bush fire and to outline a policy of safety for the balance of the summer. Out of the fire zones the wild life of the North is rushing in terror and railwaymen tell of deer and moose on the tracks.

Moscow May 31st.—The Soviet Government is gravely considering the latest demands of Great Britain in the Angora-British dispute, which are reported to include insistence upon the withdrawal of the Russian representatives from Persia and Afghanistan, where they have been accused of anti-British propaganda. The tone of the official press indicates that Russia will not likely yield further.
