TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 6th.—A Mesopotamia despatch received by the War Office today says that the garrison of the camp at Skjawao station, previously reported as besieged, was withdrawn to the town of Skjawao on September 2nd. In the course of this operation an armoured train broke down and was rushed by 4,000 insurgents. The train crew made a resolute defense and are said to have inflicted 500 casualties on their assailants, but were finally overpowered and are reported missing to the number of 45, including two British officers. A field gun, a Lewis gun, three machine-guns and forty boxes of ammunition were lost with the train.

London, Sept. 6th.—The Polish Govt. has despatched a note to Lithuania, the tenor of which amounts to an ultimatum, says a Warsaw despatch to the London Times today. The note says that unless Lithuania completely halts the southward movement of her troops, Poland will be forced to consider that a state of war exists between the countries. A full statement of the case has been forwarded to the League of Nations.

London, Sept. 6th.—A despatch to the London Times from Liege, Belgium, quotes Mr. Lloyd George as saying that if guarantees are given that the murder of policemen in Ireland will cease, the Premier is convinced that Lord Mayor McSweeney and the other hunger strikers will be released from prison and other special despatches tend to confirm the interview printed in the "Times".

Portsmouth, England, Sept. 6th.—The Trades Union Congress at which it was expected many grave industrial questions, including the coal crisis, would be considered convened here this morning. It was attended by more than 950 delegates representing 6,500,000 workers. One of the earliest acts of the Congress was the adoption of a resolution expressing "horror and indignation" at the Government's attitude in the case of Lord Mayor MacSweeney, and declaring that Labour "will hold the Govt. responsible".

London, Sept. 7th.—Mr. MacSweeney was reported appreciably weaker this morning but conscious, and able to speak but his chaplain said that he was suffering intense pain in the left side of his abdomen and heart.

London, September 7th.—The town of Tivizzano, 34 miles northwest of Lucca, has been completely demolished by an earthquake, according to a Spezia despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. The despatch adds that the Solero and Monte were badly wrecked.

Dublin, Sept. 7th.—A band of men disguised as soldiers descended yesterday upon Belleek County, Fermanagh, in motors and gained entrance to the police barracks and held up the police with
