EDITORIAL.

While not fully closed the returns received so far indicate a republican victory in the election of Mr. Harding. The finals will doubtless all be in some time today.

Senator Warren Gamaliel Harding

of Marion, Ohio, until further believed to be elected to the Presidency of the United States according to advices received by radio, was born in Ohio in the year 1865, and is thus in the prime of life. He is described as a big framed, big-hearted, "self-made" McKinley type of American, and it is said there could scarcely be a greater contrast in personality than that afforded by Senator Harding and President Wilson. The senator springs from humble origin; is the son of a country doctor and lived the life of a farmer's boy, attending the village school until fourteen years of age, when he entered the now non-existent Ohio Central College, from which he graduated. He

cut corn, painted barns, worked as a road builder, was for some time a school teacher, and turned to various other kinds of employment under the stern necessity of earning the money to complete his education. He got his first sniff of printer's ink while "sticking" type at odd times in the village printing office. Eventually he became an expert type setter, and later a linotype operator. In 1884 his father purchased for him the Marion, Ohio, "Star", then a small two-page weekly newspaper, and as the result of years of endeavor and financial hardship he succeeded in making it one of the most influential and enterprising organs in the vicinity. It is his boast that he has "successfully held every position on the "Star", from printer's devil to managing editor." During his years in the Senate he has carried with him an old printer's rule that he once used in "making-up" his newspaper forms in the composition-room. Most of us have read of his activities during the presidential campaign and his position on various important political issues. It may interest those of the "gentler" sex to learn that the President elect endorses woman suffrage.

TELEGRAM.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 29th.—The miners and the coal mine owners are about equally congratulated in the newspapers this morning on the provisional settlement of the strike arrived at. There is a general disposition to deprecate the word "victory" by either side. It is pointed out that while the men have got their cherished two shillings advance, the Govt. has secured the principle of increased production to coincide with the raise in wages. Meanwhile it is also regretfully pointed out, Europe has lost 12,000,000 tons of English coal which is badly needed, the miners have lost millions in wages, and the Govt. has lost a large slice of the surplus coal profits. One expert is bold enough to assert that the arrangement ensures ten years peace in the coal trade. The miners have still to vote on the proposals, which however are considered as eminently likely to receive acceptance. The miners under the most favourable circumstances are not likely to start full work till Monday of next week.
