PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

COLONIAL COUNCIL**FOR ST. CROIX.**

AT one o'clock p. m., Monday, December 18, 1922, the Colonial Council of St. Croix held its Fourth Ordinary Meeting for the present elective period.

The following members were present: The Chairman (Robt. L. Merwin), Holger Jessen, W. S. Abramson, Jno. L. Curry, A. V. Nelthropp, K. Henderson, F. Andersen, D. C. Canegata, F. Coulter, Robt. W. Skeoch, G. B. Fleming, D. S. Armstrong, J. Alexander and M. M. Skeoch.

Members A. J. Blackwood and D. Noll absent from the island. Furthermore were absent: A. R. McIntosh, and Thos. Ramsay.

Government Secretary (Gaffney) and Despatching Secretary (Rappolee) attended the meeting.

The following prayers were offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Wm. Allen:

Almighty God and Father, we humbly thank thee for thy help graciously vouchsafed us during the past, and we again pray thee to be present with these councillors here assembled before thee. Give them the wisdom they need, guide and direct them by thy counsels, so that by their deliberations they may accomplish those things that shall be of lasting benefit to this land and people, and an honour and glory to thy name. We ask for Jesus's sake. Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it

is in heaven, give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us, and lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Chairman remarked: Since the last meeting no communication has been received from Government, and I have received no excuses from absent members.

The minutes of the last meeting have been duly published in the St. Croix Avis as customary and if there is no objection I will consider them tacitly adopted.

There being no objection the minutes as published were tacitly adopted.

The Chairman remarked: Honorable Members before proceeding to the order of the day I desire to make a few remarks. During my absence in the United States. I was honored while in Washington by being received by the President of the United States in private audience.

As I waited in the anti-room in the White House to be ushered into the presence of the first citizen of the United States my memory became active in conjuring up images of the men of the past occupants of the White House. Would that those walls could impart to visitors some portion of the ethereal spirit with which their former illustrious occupants was so deeply imbued and who so largely contributed toward the making of our mighty republic—men whose learning and researches, whose talents and genius contributed so much to the supremacy of these United States.

It was here that John Adams a signer of the Declaration of Independence first held sway—a man of exemplary conduct. It was here that James Madison came with polished and chastened wit; and where with his able consort Dolly Madison assembled the beauty of the land to pay court to that noble example of home wifely virtue. It was here that James Monroe that mighty author of the so styled Monroe Doctrine, whose words thus expressed had such a potent influence upon the world during the past century. It was here that Andrew Jackson, "old hickory", as he was called, from his stern and unflinching sense of duty—He was not a statesman, but he was fair, he was energetic, he was prompt and he was fearless. It was here that Abraham Lincoln that giant of intellect, so lean in statue, but so mighty as a scholar and moralist, yet so kind and soft for the afflicted. It was here that William McKinley whose learning and talent and genius contributed so much toward the supremacy of the United States. And it was here that Theodore Roosevelt the mighty advocate of justice toward all men, the man whose every thought was a square deal for all held sway and who contributed so much toward increasing respect
