Fire in St. Thomas.

St. Thomas, July 10th.—At about 1.15 this morning fire broke out in the grocery shop of Henry Cartian, Pilestrade (Sabanne) and quickly spread to the neighbouring wooden buildings. The two storey house of Joseph Mena and fourteen one storey houses and tenement rooms were destroyed. The efforts of the fire brigade were greatly hampered by the scarcity of water and fortunately for the rest of the quarter it was very calm. Damage estimated at \$3,000, of which about half covered by insurance. Cause of fire not yet ascertained.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, July 6th.—The raw sugar market was unsettled early today. While Phillippines declined to the basis of 7.03 for centrifugal, on sales of 7,000 bags afloat, there appeared to be no Cubas available at the level. The raw sugar market opened 7 to 14 points lower, under liquidation, prompted by the easier ruling of the spot market, but firmed up later on covering and commission house buying, with prices at midday about unchanged. There was no improvement in the demand for refined sugar, but a good withdrawal business was reported and there seemed to be less offering from second hand holders. Prices were unchanged at 9.25 for one granulated.

Sofia, July 6th.—A report received to-night from Constantinople says that the Greeks attempted to land a regiment at Karaburnu, near the Dardanelles, and that the Turks repulsed them after severe fighting. There were many casualties on both sides. In the fighting a Turkish torpedo boat sank a Greek ship according to the Constantinople report, and many were drowned.

London, July 6th.—It is officially announced that Leonid Krassin has been removed from his position as head of the Russian Soviet delegation in London says a Reuters despatch from Moscow today.

Paris, July 6th.—For the first time since the delivery of Great Britain's questionnaire on the Ruhr and reparations problem there appeared today, in French political circles, a distinct feeling of optimism over the outcome of the conversation between the two countries. The French interpret the very lengthiness of the conversation as arguing an eventful Franco-British understanding, rather than the pursuance of separate lines of settlement with Germany. In addition to the London conversation, the British Ambassador called on M. Poincare this afternoon for a long conversation on the general reparation situation and it is understood their interview was conducted in a spirit of cordiality. In Government circles it is indicated that while France repeatedly has announced that her thesis remains intact, there are definite signs of a more conciliatory attitude and a sincere desire to find a basis acceptable to England for cooperative application of this thesis. It is the details concerning modified application of the French programme that is occupying diplomatic representatives of Great Britain and France at this time, according to authoritative quarters.

Brussels, July 6th.—The Belgian diplomatic agent at Berlin has informed the German Government that diplomatic relations will be suspended if the Reich does not repudiate unequivocally the Ruhr crimes. The French Ambassador has given similar notice.

Paris, July 6th.—M. Poincare now expects ratification of all the Washington treaties by Parliament before it takes its mid-summer recess toward the end of next week, it was learned today. Ministerial inquiries in both Houses have indicated that a large majority for ratification is probable.

Henley on Thames, July 7th.—M. K. Morris, Great Britain, is this year's winner of the Diamond Sculls, won last year by Walter of Duluth. Morris defeated H. L. Gollan in the final heat for the trophy rowed on the Thames here this afternoon. Gollan, a deaf mute, defeated Hoover, Codrigan and Belyea in heats on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, in order to qualify for the final. Morris took the lead early in the race and won by a length. His time was 8 minutes 23 seconds.
