## ST. THOMAS NEWS.

### CAPTAIN OF WHALER TO MAKE ST. THOMAS HEADQUARTERS.

On Sunday last the American whaler "Wanderer," Captain A. F. Edwards, of New Bedford, Mass., arrived off this port for mails from the States.

The "Wanderer" did not cast anchor but kept cruising up and down while Captain Edwards with a few men landed to procure the mails, and were received on the King's Wharf by Collector of Customs Boardman, Dr. Turnipseed, Captain Fisher and Mr. George Levi, the energetic senior partner of the St. Thomas Ship Brokers' Association.

The "Wanderer," which is a vessel of some 288 tons and carries a crew of 31 men, nearly all of whom are Portuguese, was out from his home port, New Bedford, fully one year, having left that port, on a whaling expedition on March 15, 1921. She scoured the North and South Atlantic in search of whales and secured 85

sperms ranging from 25 to in length, and from them were 13,000 gallons of oil.

Captain Edwards was so pleased with the appearance of the island and with the hospitality extended to him that he has decided to make his headquarters at St. Thomas in the future.

Before leaving he presented Messrs. Boardman, Levi, Turnipseed and Fisher each, with a unique souvenir, in the form of a whale's tooth. The weight of these souvenirs being from two to two and a half pounds.

New Bedford, Mass., the home port of the "Wanderer," is noted as being one of the chief home ports of the American whaling fleet.—St. Thomas Mail Notes, March 30th.

## THE PROHIBITION OFFICIAL.

Messrs. Pesquera and Berry who came up here on Sunday last from Porto Rico have started on their duties in the most enlightened manner, and their foresight in calling a meeting of the bay rum manufacturers on Tuesday afternoon has met with general approval.

The terrible plight in which the bay rum manufacturers are placed thru the forcing of prohibition on us was freely discussed by the gentlemen who met the agents.

Messrs. Pesquera and Berry, were very sympathetic and it was decided that the manufacturers should file their case with the proper authorities with the request that bay rum for export to foreign countries be not denatured.—Ibid.

## YESTERDAY'S C. C. MEETING.

The extraordinary meeting of the Colonial Council held yesterday was very interesting.

The first item on the order of the day: Introduction of and 1st discussion on Draft of Additional Moneybill to the Budget for the Municipality of St. Thomas and St. Jan for the fiscal year ending 30 June, 1922.

Frs. 15,000.00 for defraying the expenses of two representatives elected by the Colonial Council to go to Washington as delegates; proposed by the 7th elected member, C. Corneiro.

Member Corneiro introduced his bill, and in the discussion which followed Members R. Francis, Burnet, Kuntz, Holst, De Yongh and Moorehead took part.

After these gentlemen had expressed their sentiments, the Hon. Judge Thiele, Chairman of the Council, declared the first discussion closed and the bill was referred to a committee of 7 for report.
