today. There was revealed the most splendid gilded mummy case ever found in Egypt. It is about 3 metres (9½ feet) long.

Paris, Feb. 12th.—Systematic obstruction by the opposition to the Government's fiscal measures was continued yesterday, when the Chamber of Deputies took up article 2, providing that no new functionaries should be engaged or new public offices created during 1924. During the afternoon six amendments to the article were moved, five of which the government opposed, making the vote one of confidence. These five were defeated by votes showing the usual division of the past fortnight, 300 odd for the government and something over 200 against.

London, Feb. 12th.—Mr. T. P. O'Connor, Nationalist member of the House of Commons for the Scottish Division of Liverpool, has gone over to the Government side of the House. Mr. O'Connor has thrown off the mantle of opposition which he has worn so many years while still retaining his popularity and "crossed the floor of the House", because, he says in a letter to the speaker Mr. Whitley, the Irish question is now out of British politics. "The Irish question is now settled", Mr. O'Connor writes to the speaker, "and as I am an independent supporter of the Government my proper place is on the ministerial side of the House."

Belfast, Feb. 12th.—Cahir Healy, recently elected member of the British House of Commons for Fermanagh and Tyrone, has been released from the large internment camp. Healy has been held by the Government of Northern Ireland since his release in May 1922, under the defence of the realm act. The order of release prohibits him from entering a large area of Fermanagh, including his home town of Enniskillen.

London, Feb. 12th.—The members of Parliament assembled today in unprecedented circumstances, meeting for the first time under a Labour Government. The fact that the Labourites, in their own words, are taking office without power, did not diminish interest in their accession and all available public space in the House of Commons was bespoken long in advance by people eager to see the representatives of the working class occupying the front ministerial benches, which had never before been filled except by alternate Conservative and Liberal administrations, or their earlier counterparts, the Tories and Whigs.
