The price at which this article should be sold, according to list published by the Food Commission, is 9 cents a pound, but it is learned that those having it in stock will not sell more than half a pound to a single purchaser and charge 5 cents for that quantity. At such a rate the price virtually becomes 10 cents a pound.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

November 10, 1919.

Governor Oman, accompanied by Government Secretary Timmons and Lieutenant Horan, Legal Aid, attended the Extraordinary Meeting of the Colonial Council last Thursday regarding the introduction of Government's resolution to elect a committee to consider a code of laws. A statement was made to the effect that a code previously submitted to Washington had been returned as illegal, the Government made prompt announcement to the Council that no code had previously been prepared here and submitted to Washington, and that the code prepared is the original code.

The following vessels arrived at St. Thomas yesterday: American Steamer "Elinor" with general cargo from Montevideo bound for Boston. British steamer "Boverie" with cargo of nitrate from Chile, bound for Liverpool. Dutch steamer "Hercules" in ballast from Amsterdam bound for Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic.

The steamers San Juan and Caracas from New York are due to arrive in San Juan on Tuesday and Wednesday respectively.
