ST. CROIX STATION.

Coblenz, April 4th.—By order of General De Goutte, the French Commander, vast operations have been begun throughout the Ruhr and the Rhenland with the purpose of suppressing the activities of German societies.

Dublin, April 5th.—A proposal to ratify the Anglo-American liquor treaty provoked a lively debate in the Dail Eirean yesterday. Mr. Desmond Fitzgerald, Minister of Foreign Affairs, in moving the ratification of the treaty, said he had called the attention of the British authorities to the fact, that the words "King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland" no longer were descriptive of fact, but that he had not pressed upon the British Government that it take immediate steps to amend this wording, pending a settlement of the Irish boundary question. The Government, the Minister added, would endeavour to put no hindrance in the way of the United States in enforcing its own laws. Mr. Desmond moved an amendment to the proposal to the effect that the Dail should withhold approval of the treaty pending consideration of the full text of it. He challenged the whole situation represented by the use of the words "United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland", and said the Dail would have to discuss whether Sir Auckland Geddes, ex-Ambassador to the United States was authorized by the Free State Government to sign the treaty on its behalf. Mr. McCarty, ex-Government Whip, declared the procedure looked like the playing of a confidence trick on the Dail and that it was not the first time a tricky agreement had been made by the Foreign Minister. Other deputies also criticized the Government for its action with regard to the proposed treaty. The amendment of Mr. Desmond was defeated by a vote of 35 to 29. Debate on the treaty was then adjourned until next Wednesday.
