U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.

March 11, 1920.

WASHINGTON: Indications that Navy Department withheld sending all available naval craft to European waters early in the war because of a desire to keep the main body of the nations' sea strength on the Pacific were disclosed in Admiral Sims' testimony to-day before the Senate Investigating Committee. Declared that Department's policy delayed aid to the Allies ever as late as January 1918. Admiral declares he was still calling for more destroyers and by this time his predictions were being justified by results and the Department was beginning to carry out his recommendations of six and eight months before. Herbert Hoover will be called to testify probably Saturday at Admiral's request to substantiate some of his statements regarding Allies grave position about the time we entered the war. Says the Allies barely escaped a "peace without victory". Presents, number of cablegrams and letters he sent to Department and read his suggestion that fleet be kept in readiness to rush overseas without minute's delay

should need arise. Declares he wishes to show the great danger of trying to manage war by cable at distance of three thousand miles.

LOUISVILLE: In the arrest of ten young boys, police here believe they have the batteries of over thirty robberies in this city in the last few weeks. Boys with their captain ten years old were taken into custody on the charge of stealing articles from automobiles.

New York: Rescue of the steamer "Tyee", disabled and short of provisions one hundred miles west of Ambrose Channel, was reported today in wireless from steamer "Lake Marksam" that she had "Tyee" in tow.

WASHINGTON: Bond issue of two and half billion dollars to pay adjusted compensation to former service men as result of disaster, Senator Houston told Ways and Means Committee today. An increase in taxes to extend aid to former service men was suggested in the committee as the least harmful way.

WASHINGTON: Investigation of United States Grain Corporation ordered today by the Senate after much discussion.

OTTOWA: Jellico urges Navy for Canada but decision is left to Government of Canada. Minimum cost of defense of Atlantic and Pacific coast is placed at five million dollars for maintenance. England is willing and ready to provide cruisers, destroyers, and auxiliary ships without cost, but acceptance means cost of upkeep. These ships are the surplus of war construction not necessary for British Navy under reduced strength arranged for.

CEDAR RAPIDS: Marie Alice Yocum obtained divorce from her husband at Boone, Iowa, last night. This is the thirteenth time she has been divorced her attorney says since she began her pilgrimages into the realm of deathly love. She has obtained two divorces here.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, March 8th.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer, in discussing in the House of Commons today the decision not to renew the Anglo-French Loan in the United States, said that Great Britain in providing her half had no intention of rebarrowing outside the United Kingdom any part of the sum required, so that when the loan has been repaid Great Britain will reduced her external debt by more than fifty million pounds. He added, "we shall employ for the purpose the resources already available in the United States and to the extent to which they are not sufficient we shall ship gold. We have already made a beginning by buying Anglo-French Bonds in the market at a considerable discount below par."

New York, March 8th.—Surgeon General Cumming who arrived here yesterday on the "Baltic", stated that unless the United States takes every precaution, there is grave danger that typhus, bubonic plague and sleeping sickness may be brought here from Europe.

London, March 8th.—The British Ambassador at Washington will hereafter receive twenty thousand pounds sterling. His salary will be two thousand five hundred pounds and the entertainment allowance seventeen thousand five hundred pounds, Mr. Lloyd George made this announcement in the House of Commons this afternoon.

London, March 8th.—The Government has decided that it is absolutely necessary to have the second reading and discussion of the Irish Home Rule Bill before the Easter recess, Mr. Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons today. It is essential, he added, in view of the position in Ireland that it should be made plain, so far as the Government is concerned, that they meant to continue with the Bill, which was the most important measure of the session.

Washington, March 8th.—The provisions of the Income Tax of 1916, taking as income stock dividends, declared by corporations out of earnings and accruing subsequently to March 1st 1913, were held to be unconstitutional today by the Supreme Court.

London, March 8th.—A party of British officers arriving at Harbin from Omsk and Chita, declare that their experiences west of Irkutsk excelled all other previous horrors, says the London Times Harbin correspondent in a communication dated Feb. 19th. Piles
