The totality of effect in the Universal special, "The Virgin of Stambul," is that of picturesque grandeur. It is conceived and executed by mind fascinated by the mystery of oriental existence. That many-sided, many-colored life grows in gorgeous costumes and decorative backgrounds. The color and gloom, the riches and poverty, the luxury and wretchedness of that older and narrower part of Constantinople known as Stambul are skilfully visualized. They arouse sensations of romantic wonder as pictures. The Universal picture is a fine spectacle of generous treatment, with stirring ensembles and a dash of melodrama.

Priscilla Dean impersonates a beautiful beggar girl, an unveiled seeker of alms in the streets, whose character has remained clean. Her characterization has the splendid animation of a bright American girl whose energy of youth is ballasted by brains. While this may be remote from the oriental, it is very attractive, true to the environment is Wallace Beery as a wealthy Sheik with a choice harem. He is decidedly representative of the combined austerity and sensuality of oriental fanaticism. The balance of the cast is satisfactory without exception. With so much to its credit as a careful and interesting production. "The Virgin of Stambul" should be as favorably received elsewhere as it was by a crowded house at the Broadway Theatre.

GOVERNMENT OF THE
VIRGIN ISLANDS OF THE UNITED STATES
St. THOMAS.

Executive Order No. 2--1923.

In order that complete and accurate record may be kept of persons who arrive in the Virgin Islands, especially aliens, there will hereafter be kept at the ports of St. Thomas, St. John, Christiansted and Frederiksted, a book to be known as the Immigration Record in which will be recorded the following data concerning persons arriving in the Virgin Islands:

1. Full name.
2. Age.
3. Sex.
4. Color.
5. Date of arrival.
6. Name of vessel.
7. Citizenship.
8. Former residence.
9. Occupation.
10. Local address.
11. Remarks (description of passport, length of stay and other pertinent information).

The information necessary to complete this record will be procured under the cognizance of the Directors of Police in St. Thomas and St. Croix, and the Despatching Secretary at St. John. Each vessel carrying passengers will be boarded by an official from the above offices when the necessary data will be secured to be later transposed to the permanent Immigration Record. Captains of vessels will not be permitted to land passengers until the data for this record have been obtained.

Passengers who remain in a port of the Virgin Islands only during the stay of the ship, and who depart with it, need not be recorded.

The data required by the Immigration Record are in addition to the requirements of existing laws regarding Immigration foreigners, etc. in the Virgin Islands. The practice of requiring captains of ships to furnish passenger lists will be continued.
