ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Feb. 7th.—The Prime Minister would welcome the convocation of another conference, similar to the Washington Conference having as its object a further diminution of the naval and military equipments of the earth, it was learned from an authoritative source this afternoon.

London, Feb. 6th.—The movements toward the reunion of the Christian Churches were discussed by the Archbishop of Canterbury in addressing the convocation of Canterbury at Westminster this afternoon. Conferences, he said were steadily taking place at Lambeth between representatives of the Church of England, and the non-Episcopal Churches of this country and before long he hoped for the publication of "results, and not merely joint conclusions". As for reunion with the Roman Catholic Church, the Archbishop reiterated that nothing in the nature of negotiations had taken place, nor were such negotiations within measurable distance and therefore there was nothing to make public. Discussing the criticisms and clamour aroused by the conversations between Anglican and Catholics under the roof of Cardinal Mercier, Primate of Belgium, the Archbishop declared the best answer to those denouncing him as "betraying the Church, or bowing to idolatry," was silence. There were no negotiations whatever, only conversations and Cardinal Mercier had emphasized this as strongly as had he. The uniting of the forces of the Christian men on earth may be a long way off, continued the Archbishop. "I think it

is, but we must continuously and prayerfully strive toward it."

London, Feb. 7th.—A great national campaign on behalf of the unemployment workers charter union is to be launched jointly by the Council of the Trade Union Congress and the unemployment workers committee. The charter which is said to comprise the minimum demands of British Labour for measures dealing with the problem of unemployment, contains six points which the promoters declare must be immediately attained by united action. The points are. First. Work, or effective maintenance, for all unemployed and increased Government assistance to be provided through the Trade Unions, all relief being completely dissociated from the Poor Law administration. Second. Immediate development of Government schemes for employment, to absorb the unemployed in their own trades at trade union wages. Third. Establishment of state work shops to supply the necessary service or commodities to meet the requirements of the governmental departments. Fourth. Reduction in the House of Labour sufficiently to absorb the unemployed workers, the normal working day, or week, to be regulated by the requirements of industry. Fifth. Establishment of occupational training centres for unemployed workers, with effective maintenance. Sixth. Provision for suitable housing accommodation at rents within the means of the wage earners. These demands have often been set forth as ideal, but this is the first time an organized effort has been launched to attain them. The Daily Herald, Labor organ, says the movement marks an important phase in the growing cooperation between the Trade Union Congress and the organized unemployed.

New York, Feb. 7th.—The raw sugar market declared 1/8 today, because of more liberal offerings, with spot prices now quoted at 7.18, duty paid. There were sales early of 500,000 bags of Cuopas at 7.28 and 5,000 bags at 7.22 and later about 35,000 bags sold at 7.18, for prompt February shipment. The decline in the spot market led to remove heavy liquidation in raw sugar futures. Cuban interests and commission houses were the principal sellers and while the decline was checked at times by covering and trade buying, this demand was of insufficient volume to cause much of a rally. Final prices were from 7 to 10 points below the previous close. March closed

535, May 5.38, July 5.42, September 5.43, all bid. The demand for refined sugar was checked by the unsettled feeling in rays, but prices were unchanged at 8.60 to 9.00 for fine granulated. Refined futures nominal.

London, Feb. 7th.—It is learned that the question of endowing the high commissioners of the Dominions with a more important status than they have at present clearly defining such status in accordance with the representations made by some of the Dominions to the Baldwin Government, which left the matter as a legacy to the Labour Government, will be dealt with by the Ministry in a sympathetic manner. The Imperial Government already has conveyed to the Government of the dominions its eagerness to consult them in all large matters of policy where dominion interests can possibly be affected.

Berlin, Feb. 7th.—Mr. Reginald McKenna, Chairman of the Special Committee empowered by the Reparation Commission to investigate the flight of German capital, left Berlin today and the other members of the committee are leaving tomorrow, having done all the investigation, possible at this time. While the members of the committee say that German officials and bankers assisted them in their investigations they admitted that many of the facts they sought were not available.

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
