AN OLD FRIEND TO RETURN TO ST. THOMAS

Many of the inhabitants of St. Thomas
may remember the meetings held by Mr.
Tibbitts of New York a number of years
ago. For thirty years until the beginning
of the World War, Mr. Tibbitts was asso-
ciated with the supervision and field
work of the Young Men's Christian As-
sociation.

He is now and has been for twenty
years, the Director of the National Camp
and Health League and is also the direc-
tor and founder of the Gospel Volunteers
of the World.

Mr. Tibbitts is planning a return visit
to St. Thomas and is expected to sail
from New York on the s. s. "Guiana"
on December 14th, in company with Mrs.
Tibbitts, his father, son, and secretary.
They propose to make their winter head-
quarters in St. Thomas and while here
will be active in the work of the Gospel
Volunteers of the world, the aim of which
is to emphasize the Gospel fundamentals
and personal evangelism.
