### ST. CROIX STATION.

San Francisco, June 28th.—The League of Nations Covenant was championed as the "Munroe doctrine" of the world by Homer Cummings, temporary chairman of the Democratic National Convention, in his keynote address at the opening session today. Of the peace treaty defeat in the United States Senate, he said, "No blacker crime against civilization has ever soiled the pages of our history". He declared for endorsement of the peace treaty and the League of Nations by the United States without reservation of any nature. Incidentally he supported Canada's right to a vote in the League Assembly. Dealing with this phase of the subject, he said "there is great pretense of alarm because the United States has but one vote in the International Assembly against six votes of Great Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India. This popular argument against the League of Nations is insincere as it is superficial. It ignores the fact that the Executive Assembly is the governing body in the League, and that our country is one of the five countries having permanent membership in the council. The colonial votes exist only in the Assembly. "Nor should we forget that France has but one vote. Italy has but one vote, Japan has but one vote. If there were any injustice in the arrangement, surely these nations would have sensed it and objected to it.
