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TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Jan. 15th.—The Supreme Coun-
cil has drafted a Note to the Dutch Gov-
ernment asking for the extradition of
former Emperor William. The Note re-
fers to Article 227 of the Treaty of Ver-
sailles and invites Holland to join the
Allies in the accomplishment of this Act.

Paris, Jan. 15th.—It is announced that
M. Clemenceau has accepted nomina-
tion to the Presidency of the Republic.

Paris, Jan. 15th.—The terms of Peace
for Hungary were handed to the Hunga-
rian delegations this afternoon. The Hun-
garians are given fifteen days in which to
present their observations. The Peace
Treaty provides that Hungary must for-
mally waive her claims to Fiume and all
the former Austro-Hungarian territories
awarded to Italy, Rumania and Jugo-
Slavia. She must adhere to the clauses
of the Treaty with Austria, signed at St.
Germain, concerning national minorities
the Hungarian Army must not exceed
thirty five thousand men and Hungary
must assume a proportional share of the
Austrian debt. Most of the remaining
clauses are similar to the St. Germain
Treaty.

London, Jan. 15th.—Reports are cur-
rent that the British representative at
Irkutsk has been ordered to leave the
zone of hostilities, owing to the threaten-
ing situation caused by the advance of
the Soviet forces and is proceeding to
Harbin.

Balse, Jan. 16th.—Advices from Mos-
cow state that Odessa has been occupied
by the Bolsheviks.

London, Jan. 16th.—Mr. Winston
Churchill, Mr. Long, Lord Beatty and
Field Marshal Wilson have been sum-
moned to Paris for a consultation with

with Mr. Lloyd George on important
military and naval questions. A semi-
official statement issued on the 15th
seems to indicate that the Government
is apprehensive of a move eastward
threatening India, and a serious Bolshe-
viki situation in the near east threaten-
ing Mesopotamia and Persia.

Berlin, Jan. 18th.—An official tele-
gram from Danzig reports a collision be-
tween the Poles and German troops near
Argenua, in Posen, in which the greater
part of the German occupation force fell
into the hands of the Poles. The blame is
attached to the Poles, who, it is reported
advanced several hours before the time
agreed upon for the German evacuation
of the district.

Chicago, Jan. 18th.—Twelve hundred
new cases of influenza have been repor-
ted in the past forty-eight hours, and the
deaths during the period are given as
fifty one.

London, Jan. 19th.—Mr. Henderson,
leader of the Labour Party is reported as
saying that the party will resist to the
utmost any military measures that
the Government may attempt in the
near East.

Paris Jan. 19th.—Influenza of a most
violent type is reported to be sweeping
through Poland. The disease appears
with marked suddenness and there is a
high percentage of fatalities, some cases
collapsing within twenty four hours. Wo-
men and young people appear to be par-
ticularly susceptible. This is the third
epidemic of influenza that has been suf-
fered by Poland.

London, Jan. 18th.—The first German
steamer to call at this port since the war
has arrived from Hamburg, and is the
object of much curiosity.
