

Khartum, Eastern Sudan, Oct. 1st.—A party of Messalet tribesmen under the fanatical leader Abdullah Soghayer attacked Naylla on Monday, but were repulsed with heavy losses by the infantry and police. Abdullah is reported to have been killed. The British lost 5 killed, including a member of the Sudan Civil service, and Captain Chown. The rising is said to be purely local without political significance.

Tokio, Oct. 1st.—The Japanese Cabinet, after lengthy deliberation yesterday, decided in principle, according to the Ashi Shimbun, to accept the United States suggestions as to the agenda for the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and Far Eastern questions.

New York, Oct. 2nd.—Walter Hagen, of New York, won the United States Professional Golf Championship on Saturday, defeating Jim Barnes, now Open Champion, 3 to 2.

New York, Oct. 1st.—Canadian steamships are proving particularly popular with United States tourists at the present time, according to information made public at the office of Mr. Clark, Director of Special tours. All accommodation on the C. P. R. steamer "Empress of Scotland" which was chartered by Mr. Clark for a Mediterranean tour leaving New York February 4th has been taken and the "Empress of France" another C. P. R. boat was chartered by Mr. Clark this week and is to leave for the Mediterranean on February 1st.—Already over two hundred passengers have been booked for this second cruise. Eight hundred will go by the "Empress of Scotland". Arrangements have been made for two West Indian cruises out of New York by the C. P. R. "Empress of Britain". It was stated yesterday that there has been a rush of applications for accommodation on these cruises and the ship will undoubtedly carry a capacity passenger list on both trips.

Washington, Oct. 1st.—Tentative recommendation for providing work for the jobless workers of the United States, estimated at 4,000,000 were completed yesterday for submission to the National conference of unemployment. The establishment of representative emergency committees in the communities to coordinate the work of finding jobs for the involuntary idle and for registration of the unemployed, was understood to be recommended as the initial steps in the relief programme.

London, Oct. 1st.—Mr. Wilson, President of the National Sailors and Firemen Union, indulged in some plain talk concerning strikes, while giving his presidential address at the convention yesterday. "If the Trades Union movement had been wise", he said, "when the war was ended it would have made a good compromise with employers to secure industrial peace, but unfortunately a

good many of the labourites lacked the moral courage to preach what they actually believed. Chiefs of the Miners Federation, he said, "told him that one of the most colossal blunders labour had ever made, was the late stoppage in the coal mines. There are many who want turmoil from end to end of the country," said Mr. Wilson. "How that is going to help the workers I cannot understand. Such ideas are those of fools and madmen which in no way reflect the real feelings of the workers."

London, Oct. 2nd.—An urgent appeal to Australians to keep Australia a white country and a strong warning that unless white immigration was encouraged the country was likely to be swamped by Asiatics, whether the Australians were willing or not, was issued by Lord Northcliffe at Sydney, when he left there on Saturday for the Philippines. Remarking that Australia had never known war on her own soil, he told the Australians that they might forever prevent that experience if they acted wisely, quickly and unselfishly in promoting immigration in sufficient numbers to make themselves safe from invasion which they certainly were not now doing.

London, Oct. 1st.—London will again become the first port of the world, when the plans of the Belfast ship builders Harland and Wolff are in full aspiration. This firm has secured eight sites along the banks of the Thames in order to develop their scheme for the establishment of plants for repairing and redecorating ships on a large scale. It is anticipated that several thousand men engaged in various trades will be employed as it is understood that the firm will undertake practically all sorts of repair in addition to repair work on ships, barges, tugs, lock gates and machinery, the repairs to the plant belonging to the port of London authorities, will be handled by the Belfast firm. Hitherto much of the repair work, has been sent elsewhere. The company will spend over a quarter of a million pounds, on new buildings.

London, Oct. 3rd.—A situation of the utmost gravity developed in India says a despatch to the Daily Herald, the Labour organ, in consequence of the following declaration of Mahatma Gandhi, the Nationalist leader. "We must repeat the formula of the Ali brothers and we must declare from thousands of platforms that it is sinful for any Mussulman or Hindu to serve the existing Government, whether as a soldier or in any capacity whatsoever." In response to this, says the Herald, meetings are being held throughout India. The thousand persons attending a demonstration at Cawnpore, repeated, after it had been introduced by Hasrat Mohani, the chairman's wife, a resolution affirming that it was unlawful for Mussulmans to remain in the British army.

Karachi, British India, Sept. 26th.—Delayed. Mohammed Ali and Shaukat Ali, brothers, with five other supporters of the movement for noncooperation with the British, were committed for trial here today for supporting a resolution at the All India Moslem conference, declaring that it was unlawful for Mussulmans to remain in the British army. The accused said little about the evidence in court, but tried to discuss the political situation, which the magistrate declined to permit.

Calcutta, India, Oct. 3rd.—The situation in the Malabar district is becoming very serious. The rebels are offering Hindus the alternative of death or Islam. If the Indians hesitate to choose they are ordered to dig their graves. If they refuse to embrace Islam, they then are shot and dropped into their graves. Complete home rule has been declared, crops, belonging to the Hindu's have been confiscated. The Hindu's are fleeing.

Khartum, Oct. 3rd.—In the fighting at Nyalla last week when tribesmen under the fanatical leader Abdullah-EI-Soghayer, attacked the town, 600 of the tribesmen were killed. The British had 51 casualties.

Morocco, Oct. 3rd.—Continuing their advance against the Moorish tribesmen yesterday the Spanish troops engaged the rebels along a front of ten kilometres on the plains before Zueluan, inflicting casualties in killed of more than 1,000 upon the Moors. The action lasted fifteen hours.
