GUSTAVE MØLLER

1900 — 1920

After an illness of five day's Gustave Møller shuffled off this mortal coil and started on the journey from which no traveller returns.

Mr. Møller was an intelligent, polite, and industrious young man with a promising future before him—he was just about to be promoted to a prominent position on the staff of the Municipal Hospital at which institution he was clerk. At one time Møller was clerk at the Apothecary Hall. In both positions he was a favourite with those above him in office and those beneath. "To tell Gustave to do anything", said one of those who were above him in office to the writer, "was as good as having it done—he not only would not forget to do what he was told, but he was sure to do it correctly." And, conversely, "If there was anything we did not understand", said one of his subordinates, "we only had to ask Mr. Møller, he would explain it to us so very patiently".

Møller was an Anglican and was buried with all the ceremony and rituals which this Church gives to the "faithful"; and

nothing showed plainer the high esteem in which Gustave was held than the fact that nearly every respectable family in Frederiksted was represented at his funeral—and in not a few cases entire families.

**TELEGRAMS.**

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Nov. 24th.—Mr. Colby, Secretary of State in a note addressed to Earl Curzon, British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, declared that the unimpeded development of the petrol resources of the World is necessary, in order to meet the requirements. Referring to the responsibilities of the mandatory powers, the note also declares that it is of the highest importance for the future peace of the World that foreign territories transferred as a result of the war should be administered in such a manner as to assure equal treatment of the commerce of the citizens of all nations. It declares that although the United States is not a member of the league, it does not consider that it should be excluded from the advantages of the principle of equality of treatment, as might be supposed by the declaration that the mandates for Mesopotamia and Palestine were prepared with a view to obtaining equality of treatment for all the nations belonging to the League. The American Govt. is opposed to the point of view of Earl Curzon that the terms of the mandates can only be discussed by the Council of the League and by the signatories to the covenant. Mr. Colby affirms that the establishment of the principle of mandates is a new principle in international relations and one in which public opinion takes particular interest and that it appears to demand a more frank discussion of all points of view appertaining thereto.

Paris, Nov. 24th.—M. Deschanel, who was recently compelled to resign as President of the Republic, owing to the state of his health, is now stated to have recovered and a few more weeks of rest will suffice to complete his cure.

London, Nov. 25th.—M. Leygues, President of the Council of Ministers of France, arrived here this evening for a conference of three days with Mr. Lloyd George. Although his visit has for its first object the discussion of the question of the probable return of former King Constantine to the throne of Greece, his interviews with Mr. Lloyd George will without doubt be concerned with the whole situation in the near East. It is believed that the revision of the Turkish treaty, which has not yet been ratified, will be studied and this opinion is supported by the fact that Italy has been invited to send a representative. Count
