TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London Sept. 24th. The "Times" referring editorially to the passing of a resolution in favour of imperial trade preference by the Chamber of Commerce Congress at Toronto, says the case for preference is much misrepresented in Great Britain. Its enemies, says the writer in the "Times", have tried to show that it involves an attempt by the dominions to dictate the fiscal policy of Great Britain. That accusation has been disproved again and again by explicit denials from dominion statesmen, who have shown their only desire is to recommend to the people of this country policy which they have found advantageous to British trade in general. The decision of the Congress again supports that view.

Warsaw Sept. 27th. Grodno, an important city in northwestern Russia on the Lithuanian frontier has been captured by Polish troops after heavy fighting.

London Sept. 27th. A retirement by the Russians in the Grodno region is admitted by the Russian Soviet War Office in Sunday's official statement on military operations received by wireless today.

London, Sept. 27th.—Several United States business men have recently had daily interviews with Leonine Krassin, head of the Russian Bolshevik Trade Mission here, regarding the opening of commercial relations with Russia, says the "Times". Mr Frank Vanderlip of New York is in Moscow to begin conversations with the Soviet Economic Council and the paper says "there is no doubt that if the United States manufacturers decide to resume business relations with Russia, they will find plenty of business awaiting them". It is the general opinion in Soviet circles that peace with Poland will soon be an accomplished fact, providing that country does not press a claim for a large indemnity.

London, Sept. 28th.—Sugar in stock on the 25th. inst., was 113,000 tons. Last year 125,000 tons.

Cork, Sept. 27th.—A violent explosion shook this city about two o'clock this morning. It was followed by the rattle of rifle fire in various parts of the business districts. When the towns people ventured forth later in the morning after the Curfew had expired, they found the main thoroughfare, Patrick Street, covered with glass and the front of a large Department store, which is said to employ a large number of young Sinn Feiners, completely wrecked as if by bombs. Windows were smashed in the upper stories of almost every shop in the vicinity. At military headquarters it was said that a preliminary report showed there were no military patrols near the wrecked store at the time of the explosion, but that troops were hastened to the scene. They were fired on by snipers from the roof, according to the report.
