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## TELEGRAMS.

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, July 12th.—A column of Turkish Nationalists attacked the Greeks West of Brusa, Asia Minor, and the Greeks were forced to retreat after suffering losses, says a despatch from Angora today.

London, July 12th.—Eamon De Valera and the other Irish Republican leaders who are to participate in the conference with Mr. Lloyd George here on Thursday, arrived in London from Dublin this evening. They received a tumultuous reception at Euston.

Washington, July 12th.—The receipt of the formal acceptance by France of Mr. Hardings invitation to join in an international conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern problems was announced today by the State Dept. This was the first formal reply to the invitation to be received.

London, July 12th.—The disarmament conference continues to be the most prominent topic of discussion, dividing honours with the Irish peace conference. No doubt is felt in London that all the Nations invited will accept and as the French Premier seems already to have decided to go Washington, it is considered all the more likely that Mr. Lloyd George will also go, provided that the state of affairs at home at that time will permit his absence and that his health will permit him to take the trip, as there has been talk of the Premier taking a long rest in Switzerland by advice of his physician.

Washington, July 12th.—The enactment at the present time of adjusted compensation legislation for veterans of the war would imperil the financial stability of the nation, Mr. Harding told

the Senate today, in the second address he had made to that body during his administration. Every obligation is to the disabled and dependent, he said, and the executive branch of the Government owed it to the country to frankly state the difficulties we daily are called upon to meet and the added peril this measure (soldier bonus bill) would bring.

After four months survey of conditions, he said, he was fully persuaded that three things were essential to restoration, those were the revision and reduction of internal taxation, the refunding of the war debt and the adjustment of Foreign loans. He declared that it was virtually necessary to settle these problems before adding to the treasury any such burden as is contemplated in the pending soldiers bonus. He said it was unthinkable to expect business revival while maintaining the expensive taxes of war and just as unthinkable to reduce tax burdens while committing the treasury to additional obligations ranging from 3 to 5 thousand million dollars. Overburdening of the treasury now means positive disaster in the years immediately before us. Miss Prudence calls out in warning. The President said that while the United States participated in none of the distributable awards of the war, the world owed the nation heavily and would pay when restoration was completed. If restoration fails, world bankruptcy follows.

London, July 12th.—In a message is

sued to the English people on his arrival here yesterday De Valera said. "There is no reason why the peoples of these two Islands should continue at enmity. It is simply a question of recognizing justice as a necessary foundation of peace."

Peking, July 13th. The Chinese Foreign Office, according to the best information obtainable, has replied to Mr. Harding's disarmament conference proposal through the Chinese Minister in Washington, urging the inclusion of China in the conference.
