A copy of the present list of goods is submitted to the Chairman of the Colonial Council herewith.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

French Military Headquarters, Mayence, Germany, May 2nd.—One division of black Moroccan infantry and one division of cavalry, commanded by General Simon, in 15 trains, left this evening for the Ruhr. They will arrive in Dusseldorf Tuesday morning.

London, May 2nd.—The Australians won the first match of their tour here against Leicestershire by an innings and 252 runs, the Australians declared for seven wickets, Leicestershire made 156 and 142.

London, May 3rd.—Nine days remain for Germany to inform the Entente of her intentions relative to the payment of reparations and give guarantees for the execution of her promises. She must deal directly with the Allies, it was believed here today, as the United States Secretary of State was deemed to have closed "the door to Washington", in the note he sent to the German capital late last night. Mr. Huggins suggested that the German Govt. immediately make to the Allies a "clear, definite and adequate proposal, which would in all respects meet its just obligations." The sum 6,600,000,000 pounds was fixed yesterday as the principal of the German reparations debt. Germany will be asked either to acknowledge or repudiate this obligation on May 12th. The Supreme Council will send its demand to Berlin through the Allied reparations commission.
