TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Stockholm, May 2nd.—The entire nation was plunged into mourning by the death yesterday of the Crown Princess. The official report of the doctors who attended her gives the cause of death as general blood poisoning or pyaemia. She had suffered from inflammation of the ear, which necessitated an operation last December and this was followed by maxillary suppuration. Last Friday morning erysipelas developed in the right ear, but the Princess still appeared to be in no danger and was able to be up on Saturday morning, she suffered, however, a sudden change for the worse and died within a few hours. Weakness of the heart, augmented by the Crown Princess expected motherhood is given as the cause of her sudden death.

Philadelphia, May 2nd.—The Oxford and Cambridge universities team won the two mile college championship relay race of America here, on Saturday afternoon, defeating seven of the leading colleges of the country. The university of Illinois was second, some forty yards behind the flying Englishmen, Pennsylvania third and Cornell fourth. The race was won in a new world's record time of seven minutes fifty and two-fifths seconds, supplanting the seven minutes fifty-three seconds held jointly by the Irish-American and Yale university teams, made respectively in nineteen ten and nineteen sixteen.

Auckland, New Zealand, May 2nd.—The Prince of Wales resumed his tour of New Zealand by train today, the strike of the railwaymen having been ended. This afternoon he reached Taumarumui. He has been welcomed everywhere

London, May 2nd.—Mr. Lloyd George has been ordered by his physicians to remain in bed for a few days because of what is declared as a mild attack of bronchitis and fatigue. The Premier's indisposition first became noticeable at Friday's conference at the conclusion of which he cancelled an appointment to visit the King on Friday at Windsor Castle.

London, May 2nd.—The Duke of Devonshire had a cordial send off at London and Liverpool yesterday, on the occasion of his return to Canada.

Washington, May 5th.—Secretary Daniels today ordered a division of destroyers now at New York with the Atlantic

fleet to sail immediately for Key West where they will be held for possible duty in Mexican waters. The tender Black Hawk and six destroyers will leave today.

London, May 5th.—Sir Robert Horne, President of the Board of Trade, speaking at a dinner of the London Chamber of Commerce, said that the present state of British trade showed that the nation could go forward with the greatest confidence. Unemployment, he said, was lower than at any period before the war, although about eight hundred thousand more people are engaged industrially about eighty-five per cent of the returned soldiers have been absorbed in industry.
