TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Athens, Feb. 29th.—The National Assembly today voted confidence in the Kafandaris Government. The vote was 233 to 106. With the vote, the political fortunes of ex-Premier Venizelos suffered another reverse. For the first time since his recent illness he visited Parliament and tried to induce the Kafandaris Government to agree to the Republican proposal that dynastic and constitutional questions be decided by the National Assembly, subject to confirmation by a referendum. M. Venizelos was influenced by the military leaders who want the dynasty abolished by action of the assembly only and who will refuse to abide by the result in the event the referendum should favour a retention of the monarchy. Some of the military party threatened a military dictatorship.

New York, Feb. 26th.—Members of the recently reorganized special service division of the Police Department, which has as its duties liquor law enforcement and suspension of vice, have been charged with failure in the performance of their duty by Commissioners Enright. The Commissioner has given the squad from 30 to 60 days to dry up the City.

London, Feb. 26th.—Nineteen Liberal members of Parliament have signed a manifesto against the Government plan for laying down five new cruisers and two destroyers. They declare that these ships are not necessary at present for naval defence and are being built under a pretext, providing profitable work for shipbuilding constituencies.

6. Colonial Council Bill No. 19. Fourth Council, First Session. Introduction of and 1st discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 19, draft of an ordinance introduced by 2nd Member for Frederiksted Town (Merwin), providing for a revision of public holidays in St. Croix.
