TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Moscow, May 7th.—The Russian Govt. threatens to recall its Ambassador to Germany unless full satisfaction is made for the recent raid on the offices of the Russian Commercial Delegation in Berlin.

Berlin, May 7th.—Satisfaction not having yet been given by the Government for the police raid on the quarters of the Russian Commercial Delegation here, the Russian Embassy has announced that it is temporarily putting an end to all commercial relations with Germany, in addition to closing the Commercial Office in Berlin. Five of those arrested by the police in Saturday's raid are still in jail.

London, May 6th.—The United States won the international club court tennis championship in competition with Great Britain and France, when Jay Gould of Philadelphia and C. Snyder Cutting of New York defeated C. N. Bruce and R. H. Hill of London, 1923 title holders, in the final round today 8-3, 6-8, 8-5.

Moscow, May 7th.—In the absence of any satisfactory explanation from the German Government, concerning the recent police raid on the Soviet Trade Headquarters in Berlin, the Russian Government is taking an increasingly serious view of the affair. All the Soviet newspapers describe the incident in scare head type and publish long condemnatory editorials in which they warn Germany that it adequate apology is not forthcoming, complications may ensue from which Germany will be the first to suffer.

Wellington, N. Z., May 7th.—What is happening now with regard to Empire preference will not in the slightest effect our loyalty to the Empire, the Premier said today in an interview. "British we are and British we intend to remain. I hope that some day our fellow citizens in Great Britain will learn to look on such matters as imperial preference in an Empire spirit, rather than the narrower outlook which suits some particular section of the community." Mr. Massey said he thought the time had come to seriously consider the question of having free trade throughout the Empire in food-stuff and raw materials.

San Francisco, May 7th.—President Coolidge had a plurality of 104,983 in yesterday's race for California's endorsement as a Republican presidential candidate in the 3,666 of the states 6,974 precincts.

Mr. McAdoo made a runaway race for endorsement for the Democratic nomination.

London, May 7th.—A national building strike is regarded as inevitable as the workers in the various associated traders have recently rejected the offer of the employers which the latter declared is the last they will make.

New York, May 7th.—A new low record for the year was established in raw sugar market today, when sales were reported at 578 for Cuban, duty paid, a decline of 18 cents.

London, May 7th.—Mr. Buxton, Minister of Agriculture, states that he is preparing a bill to give effect to the Imperial Conference recommendations with regard to the admission to Great Britain of pedigree stock from other parts of the Empire.

Lubeck Germany, May 7th.—Mine fields covering 280 square miles have been discovered in the Eastern Baltic, off Finland. The mines are said to be of Russian origin, dating from the World War. This is taken here as confirming the findings of the Stettin Marine Office that the recent sinking of a German ship in the Baltic was due to explosion of a mine.

St. Johns, May 7th.—The Warren Govt. has resigned, it was announced late this afternoon, the resignation following close on the action of Mr. Hawco, Minister of Posts in the Warren Govt., who has resigned both his portfolio and his seat in the Warren Executive and has announced himself as a supporter of Mr. Hickman, the opposition leader. Late this afternoon a cabinet meeting was called, at the close of which the wartime minister announced that the Govt. had resigned. Mr. Warren further announced that he would recommend to His Excellency Governor Allardye to call on Mr. Higgins, K. C., to form a new Ministry. The prediction is made in this city that Mr. Higgins will refuse such an invitation and that an invitation will then be extended to Mr. Hickman, leader of the opposition, who has a strong party following and is reported to be ready for the election campaign. The resignation of Mr. Howco from the Ministry of Posts and his seat in the Warren Executive was published in this evening's "Advocate" the opposition organ. The letter, which created a sensation in Government ranks and throughout the city, strongly criticized Prime Minister Warren on charges of disloyalty to his former leader and his party colleagues.

Berlin, May 8th.—M. Krestinsky, the Russian Ambassador to Germany, left for Moscow last evening. M. Somania-kow, chief of the Russian Commercial Delegation in Germany, will depart from Moscow today.

Lisbon, May 8th.—Portugal's long distance air effort has come to grief in at Jodhpur, India, a message to the Air Ministry said today. The two Portuguese airmen attempting a flight from Lisbon
