## TELEGRAMS.

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Geneva, Dec. 12th.—The League Council this afternoon discussed the military status of Danzig in time of war, but failed to reach an agreement. Indications however point to modifications as likely to be adopted. France supports Poland's claim for complete military control of Danzig in wartime, while the British hold that another power, possessing a large fleet, should share the responsibility with Poland.

The Hague, Dec. 14th.—Diplomatic relations between Holland and Jugo-Slavia have been broken off, it was stated here today. Holland has recalled her minister from Belgrade and has dismissed the Serbian Charge D'affaires at the Hague. The action was taken as the result of what the Dutch Foreign officials term a long series of insults to the Dutch Government. The beginning of the difficulty was the arrest in the early part of the war without notification to Holland of the Dutch consul at Belgrade, who was an Austrian subject. Since then, according to the Foreign Office, repeated efforts by Holland to adjust the difficulties amicably had met with insolent treatment. The break is only a diplomatic incident, and no other developments are expected, the Associated Press correspondent was told at the Foreign Office today.

Washington, Dec. 13th.—The repeal of most of the wartime laws was voted today by the House, which adopted the Volstead Resolution for that purpose after two hours debate. The vote on adoption of the Resolution was unanimous, 323 votes being recorded as favouring it, with none opposing it. The House before taking the final vote, ac-

cepted an amendment providing for the inclusion of the Lever Food Control Act among the laws which the Resolution would repeal. The Amendment which covers all provisions of the Food Control Act, with the exception of the section relating to rents in the district of Columbia was carried by a vote of 179 to 137, the Resolution which now goes to the Senate, exempts from repeal only the trading with the enemy act and its amendments and measures dealing with the issuance of liberty and victory bonds. The measure as adopted is practically identical with that passed by Congress just before the adjournment of the last session and vetoed by President Wilson. Republican leaders of the House asserted tonight that adoption of the resolution was one of the first steps taken by the Republican pledge to put the country on a peace-time basis.
