ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed In Transmission).

Ottawa, Aug. 6th.—Immediate action

by the Imperial Press Union, looking to the establishment of quicker and cheaper transmission of news throughout the British Empire, is called for in the resolution unanimously adopted by the Imperial Press Conference at its session here today. The resolution was originally proposed by Mr. Robert Donald, Chairman of the Empire Press Union, was carried over from yesterday and re-drafted, in order to include suggestions from practically every delegation to the conference, and it constitutes the most important item in the agenda. The resolution urges the Govts. to use their influence to increase cable facilities and reduce cable rates for news messages, and it definitely endorses the principle of a universal cable rate of one penny a word within the British Empire.

Ottawa, Aug. 6th.—Speaking before a gathering, which included the Governor-General of the Dominion, members of the Govt. and of Parliament, delegates to the Imperial Conference from the four corners of the Empire, and others prominent in the life of the dominion, the Premier last night enunciated the principle, which, in his opinion, should govern writers and distributors of news. "The distribution of news is now the greatest trust in the whole body democratic," he declared. The opportunities for good are infinite and the possibilities for mischief are just as vast. In my way of looking at it there is only one motto an editor need bother about and that is "tell the truth". For the good newspaperman I think there is only one proverb and that is "the truth shall be free".

Rome, Aug. 7th.—Authorization to occupy Constantinople has been given to the Greeks by the Allied nations, according to a despatch received here.

Paris, Aug. 7th.—M. Millerand will leave at seven o'clock tonight for Hvythe, where he will confer with Mr. Lloyd George relative to the Polish situation. The newspapers here declare Marshal Foch will be present at the Premiers' conference, and that military aid for Poland consisting of one or two divisions each from France, Great Britain, Hungary, Rumania, Letvia, and possibly other nations, is one of the emergency measures to be discussed by the Premiers. This plan as well as other measures have been recommended by the French and British missions at Warsaw. It has been pointed out that Hungary, particularly, can send good cavalry into the field. All these divisions, it is understood, would be fully equipped and it has been proposed that these reinforcements take the field before Warsaw to defend it.

BUILD HOSPITAL TO AID IN HOOKWORM CAMPAIGN

Is Located at Utuado Where Department of Health is at Work; Report at Rockefeller Work.

The campaign to lessen the number of cases of uncinariasis, more commonly known as hook worm, is being carried on vigorously by the Insular Health Department, and bringing results.

In the district of Utuado, one of the regions where the most cases of hookworm have been found, a hospital has been erected, which accommodates thirty patients, and where some nine hundred patients are treated from this one district each week. The hospital was built in order to make the campaign against hookworm more effective.

One of the encouraging features with regard to this campaign is the fact that the people are willing to do what they are told as a means to being cured of the disease more rapidly. Up to this time three thousand latrines have been up in this region, this being one of the first steps essential to the success of the campaign. Those who have not put up the latrines have been able to furnish very good excuses for their failure to comply with the order given out by the Insular Health Department. The officials of this department have not used any compulsory methods in connection with the carrying out of these orders, in fact, there seems to be a spirit of cooperation on the part of the people which is helping greatly in the progress of the campaign.

The Department hopes to extend this work to Laro, San Sebastian, Maricao, Adjuntas and Jayuya, and a physician who is coming to Porto Rico to represent the Rockefeller Institute will take charge of the work once the sanitary and initial work is completed.

The legislative body appropriated the sum of \$300,000 at its last session, for this specific work, and while the amount is by no means adequate to the needs, the Insular Health Department is determined to do its best with the funds in hand to wipe out hookworm in Porto Rico.

What the Rockefeller Foundation is doing.

In a review of the activities of the Rockefeller Foundation during 1919, President George E. Vincent tells of the campaign for the control of malaria and the elimination of the hookworm. The southern part of the United States, Mexico, Central America and the Northern countries of South America, lie within the malaria belt, and President Vincent said that malaria is threatening \$8,000,000 people within that area.

The practical measures for fighting the disease, he said, are the elimination of the anopheles mosquito, which car-
