Memorandum of Fire Which Occurred on 10 July 1923

At or about 1.10 this a. m. a fire was discovered in the store of Herman Cartier, No. 9b Pilestrade, Kronprinsens Quarter, by the owner who resides in the room adjoining the said store. At the time of the discovery the fire had gained considerable headway owing to the fact that he deals, among other things, in kerosine.

The close proximity of the neighboring living quarters, which was of a very poor and flimsy construction caused the fire to spread rapidly, with the result that the following properties were totally destroyed:

resulting in a total loss of approximately \$8,000.00 which was partially covered by insurance.

The fire apparatus was immediately on the scene but owing to the inadequate water supply in that vicinity and the great length of hose which had to be used in order to reach the nearest fire-hydrant caused some delay in extinguishing the fire.

A great number of people, both natives and Officers and enlisted personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps, displayed great energy in handling the hose and assisting in putting out the fire.—*The Bulletin* 10 July.
