London, Sept. 5th.—The Leveson-Gowers XI continued their first innings yesterday at Scarborough scoring 218 runs. The match will be further played today.

Osaka, Sept. 3rd.—The Minister of Marine today estimated the fatalities from the earthquake and fire in Tokio alone, at 150,000.

San Francisco, Sept. 3rd.—A cablegram from the Japanese Consul General at Shanghai to the Japanese Consul General here, was made public today. "About a million are homeless, and approximately 160,000 dead and injured" the message said. "In the district of Yokohama and Hakone great damage loss of life is reported. The homeless are being cared for by the Japanese relief office for sufferers." The cable-

gram was dated September 2nd and was sent from Osaka.

Osaka, Sept. 3rd.—The Italian and French Embassies in Tokio were destroyed by the earthquake. This information is given in a late wireless message from that City.

Nagasaki, Sept. 3rd.—Prince Masayoshi, ex-Premier and Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal, has died from injuries sustained in the earthquake, according to a report received by the Nagayo Railway Bureau.

Osaka, Sept. 3rd.—It is reported that Viscount Takahashi, ex Premier, and twenty leading members of the Seiyukai (or Government party) were killed on Saturday, while holding a conference. A representative of the Osaka Jiji Shimso met a number of destitute foreigners at Hakone who stated that about 40 foreigners had perished there.

Hongkong, Sept. 3rd.—An intercepted wireless message received here reports that the office buildings of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company Ltd. in Yokohama were destroyed. The general agent of the Company, who made the report, was unable to say definitely as to the fate of his staff.

Liverpool, Sept. 3rd.—The Japanese naval bases at Kamakura and Yokosuka were entirely destroyed by the earthquake, according to despatches received by the Japanese Consulate here. Eight of the fifteen districts in Tokio were partially destroyed and the fires are not yet under control in some districts. All the bridges over the river traversing Tokio were carried away by the tidal wave. The small volcano on the island of Koshima thirty miles from Tokio, is erupting.

London, Sept. 3rd.—The King has sent the following message of condolence to the Emperor of Japan. "I hasten to express to your Imperial Majesty the horror with which I learned of the appalling disaster which has befallen your country by the earthquake and its terrible consequences at Tokio, Yokohama, and other

places. I sympathize profoundly with Your Majesty in this overwhelming catastrophe resulting in loss of life and property and in untold sufferings to thousands of your people."

Rome, Sept. 3rd.—The Pope has sent through the Apostolic Delegate in Tokio profound condolences to the Japanese imperial family and the Government and people of Japan.

ARCHEOLOGICAL FINDS IN TENNESSEE.

W. E. Meyer, a Smithsonian Institution archeologist who for several weeks has been exploring ancient mounds in the vicinity of Nashville, Tenn., reports the discovery of an ancient camp fire in the ashes of which were fragments of animal bones, broken pottery and arrow heads. A well defined layer of pleistocene clay covered the remains of the fire. Meyer estimates the age of the ancient civilization of the region at between 25,000 and 50,000 years.—*The Pathfinder*.

RADICALS OUSTED FROM TOLEDO.

Mr. and Mrs. Salvador Ross, New York radicals, narrowly escaped being lynched for attacking the character of the late President Harding at Toledo. They were dragged from a street corner where they were speaking and taken in a car several miles out in the country. They were compelled to kiss the American flag and were then released on condition that they immediately leave Toledo. Ross said he had been sent to Toledo as an organizer from the Chicago office of a political organization.—*Ibid*.
