New York, June 8th.—Secretary of
War, Weeks, in an address today to the
graduating class of New York Univer-
sity, declared that war between the Uni-
ted States and Great Britain was an im-
possibility. He opposed disarmament
for the United States on the ground that
there are active and feverish military
preparations among those with whom
the United States might possibly come
in contact, but added "I want to say
here and now that I cannot give a mo-
ment's serious consideration to the pos-
