bill to provide that persons owing allegiance to any country other than the United States of America shall not be eligible to hold office as member of the Colonial Council of the Virgin Islands of the United States, nor to hold any public office under the government of said islands. Also that the income tax laws now in force in the United States of America and those which may hereafter be enacted shall be held to be likewise in force in the Virgin Islands, except that the proceeds from such taxes shall be paid into the treasuries of said islands. This will undoubtedly prove a matter of interest to many residing in these islands, and from the general

nature of its wording this resolution would appear to affect include the Danes who by virtue of the conditions of the sale-treaty retain the same rights they enjoyed before the change of flag. Like everything else there are the pros and cons; some will find it to advantage to have Congress pass laws on the basis of the resolution outlined; and there will be many to take the opposite view. As regards the application to these islands of the income tax system of the United States, this will place the assessment of this tax on a very equitable basis. The man with taxable income will pay his full due, and there will be more personal exemption. There will also be the system of payment by instalment such as is the purpose of the resolution on the Order of the Day for the Council's meeting of next Monday, to be introduced by Hon. R. W. Skeoch, 3rd elected member for Christiansted Country District.

LOCAL.

The Telephone Central at this end of the island has been transferred from the Fort to a room in the western wing of the Custom House. This change is understood to be made in the interest of efficiency of service which it will be easier to maintain at the new location.

The Public School Building to which a concrete structure gallery has been built in place of the old one of wood, is nearing completion and looking smart with the name "Christiansted Public School" engraved in the concrete cornice facing King St. The iron railing between the pillars is being replaced with concrete.

The postmaster has received advice that the "Creole" sailed from St. Thomas at 7 p. m. yesterday with mails from St. Thomas and Porto Rico. The weather which has been calm all night has, however, delayed her arrival.

The American Red Cross.

WASHINGTON, D. C. The Porto Rican Chapter of the American Red Cross was early on the scene with food and supplies to assist the fire victims at Puerta de Tierra, it was announced today by the Insular and Foreign Division.

This was the biggest fire in the history of Porto Rico, the estimated loss being over one million dollars. Hundreds of men, women and children were left in the streets without food and shelter and exposed to the storm which swept the city in the wake of the flames. Miss Kathleen d'Olier, recently arrived in Porto Rico to take charge of the Red Cross Nursing Service, directed the care and feeding of the disaster victims.
