ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Nov. 4th—German marks to day suffered the severest slump they have yet experienced in the London exchange market, being quoted during the noon hour at 9.50 to the pound sterling, after opening at 8.75. The market was at a loss to account for the depreciation in the quotations, beyond the influences already known to be at work and the fact that selling orders were heavy.

Berlin, Nov. 4th—The dollar reached 210 marks yesterday the highest record, with reports that the United States holders of the mark were unloading heavily. Locally, the unusual steady falling German currency was accredited to "our uncertain political situation", and Germany's great poverty.

London, Nov. 4th—Alleged hardships suffered by British subjects at Ellis Island, New York, came up for brief consideration in the House of Commons yesterday, when Mr. Cecil Harmsworth, Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs, was asked whether representations had been made to Washington on this score. He replied that judging by the distressing accounts received of the treatment of British subjects at Ellis Island, and the conditions under which they were compelled to live, the strongest complaints could be justified repeated representations were made to the United States Govt., declared the Under Secretary, "but I regret to say without result, but further negotiations are proceeding at the present moment, which I hope may lead to some permanent improvement".

Chicago, Nov. 4th.—Expressing the convictions that Great Britain and the United States must stand together for fellowship's sake, Admiral Lord Beatty



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in an address before the Commercial Club here last night, asserted that if the two great English speaking nations kept together they had nothing to fear in the world. Speaking of the coming conference on limitation of armaments, the Admiral said, "It is full of hope and desire that great things shall come out of it. Surely a formula can be devised which will reduce the great burdens which now lie upon the peoples, and enable our countries to reestablish the industries of peace, and the contentment of mankind."

London, Nov. 4th—Mr. Bonar Law conferred with Mr. Lloyd George last night and is taking a hand in the efforts to reach a settlement of the Irish situation. The Daily Mail, in discussing Mr. Bonar Law's interview with Mr. Lloyd George, said today that he would, if necessary, bring independent influence to bear upon the Unionists, with the view to achieving a complete agreement.
