ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Feb. 3rd.—Great Britain's gradual recovery to normal or pre war conditions is forcibly illustrated in the recent upward course of her exchange. Two years ago, February 4th, 1920, demand bills on London suffered the most disastrous collapse in this market with all other international currencies falling to the unprecedented low quotation of \$3.19. Today, on the continuance of a ten day advance and on buying which shows to trace of foreign origin the same bills found ready sale at 4.30 7/8. London, Feb. 3rd.—Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, declared in a statement issued this morning that he had been told by Mr. Collins, head of the Southern Ireland Provisional Government at their conference in Dublin yesterday that Mr. Collins had made promise of bringing into the Irish Free State almost half of North Ireland, including Fermanagh, Tyrone large parts of Armagh and Down, Londonderry City, Enniskillen and Newry. Sir James said he had suggested to Mr. Collins a weeks adjournment for consideration of the situation regarding the boundaries between Ulster and South Ireland, but that Mr. Collins had replied, that the differences separating them were so wide, that postponement would be useless. The Ulster Premier's statement was made to the press after he had conferred with Mr. Winston Churchill, the Colonial Sec-

retary at the Colonial Office, following Sir James arrival from Dublin. In it Sir James emphasized the gravity which he attached to the hitch in the negotiations with the Provisional Government. I went to Dublin yesterday, he said, to discuss with Mr. Collins certain outstanding questions hoping to promote peace in Ireland. It was only when I started from Belfast however, and reading the morning papers that I suspected a change of attitude on the part of Mr. Collins. I noticed that he had received deputations of the Sinn Feiners from different parts of Ulster the previous day, demanding that their areas should be taken into the Free State. Mr. Collins replied to the deputations that they were only trying to force open the door and using unnecessary energy in doing so. Mr. Arthur Griffith, who also was present said he and his fellow delegates had urged the claims of these districts for weeks during the negotiations in London and the result was that the Free State should extend over Ireland, that Ulster should have the option of voting herself out within a month, but that if she did so a boundary commission would be set up to decide if such districts should come into the Free State. That, said Mr. Griffith was the position today, I decided, continued the Ulster Premier, to have the matter cleared up immediately, so as to obviate even a shadow of further misunderstanding, and I have to admit that in the conversations with Mr. Collins yesterday the difficulties regarding the Ulster boundaries have revived in an intensified form. I am offering to lay down my views for the whole British Cabinet added Sir James, and will consult my colleagues in our local Parliament and in the Imperial Parliament regarding the steps to be taken in consequence of the serious situation, one which is not of my making, but which I earnestly tried to avoid.

London, Feb. 2nd.—The condition of Sir Donald MacMaster, M. P. for the Chertsey division of Surrey, who has been seriously ill for months, is now very serious.

Rome, Feb. 4th.—Another ballot for the election of a successor to Pope Benedict was taken by the conclave of the sacred college this morning, but without result, no candidate receiving a sufficient number of votes.

Washington, Feb. 4th.—Just after three o'clock this morning the sixth plenary session of the arms conference got under way for the final acts of the history making events, which have consumed exactly twelve weeks. Today's programme was a formal completion of the Far Eastern programme by the adoption of several treaties already agreed to and to clear the way for the final session Monday, when an address by President Harding will close the conference as it was begun on November 12th. The general Far Eastern Treaty embodying the Root four points and the
