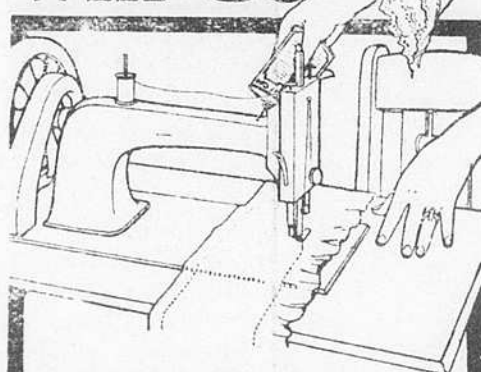
Philadelphia, July 13th.—Trovers and Marston, amateurs defeated Duncan and Mitchell, British professionals, in their 26 hole golf match at the Merion Cricket Club course today, by 4 up and 2 to play. Marston clinched the victory for the home team by sinking a long putt for a "bird" three on the 36th green.

New York, July 13th.—The raw sugar market continued steady today, with sales of 40,000 bags of Porto Rico's at 4.38 C cif, the refined sugar market was less active and unchanged at a range of 5.20 for fine granulated, with little business possible at the outside prices.

London, July 13th.—The Prince of Wales has received an official invitation from the Japanese Government to visit Japan at the conclusion of his tour of India, which according to recent announcement, is to begin about the end of October. The Prince, who recently contracted a cold has been resting this week, on orders of his medical adviser. This has necessitated the cancellation of several engagements. The exertion of an almost continuous round of official functions in various parts of the country during the past few weeks has proved a tax on the Prince's strength.

Paris, July 13th.—Professor Lippman of the academy of sciences, who was a member of the French mission which visited Canada recently to thank the Dominion for the part she played in the war died on board the steamer "France" in which he was returning from America. A wireless message from the "France" which is due at Havre tomorrow, conveyed word of the death of the eminent scientist. The nature of the attack which

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caused professor Lippman's death is not disclosed, but it is said that he had suffered great fatigue in travelling. Professor Lippman was the winner of the Nobel prize for physics in 1908. He served as Professor in the university of Paris since 1883. He enunciated the principle of the conservation of electricity and discovered in 1891 a method of photographing in colours.

Stockholm, July 13th.—Prince William of Sweden was suddenly taken ill with malaria during his hunting expedition in the Belgian Congo, and his condition is serious, it was announced here today. The Prince, who is second son of King Gustav, was stricken with a similar illness during his visit to Central America last year. He has been in Africa several months.

London, July 13th.—The financial situation of South Africa is causing anxiety according to cables received here, a statement just made by the finance min-

ister of the union, shows that the Government revenues during the first two months of the present fiscal year were 450,000 pounds below the estimates.

London, July 14th.—Eamon De Valera arrived at No. 10 Downing Street at four thirty o'clock this afternoon for his conference with Mr. Lloyd George set for that hour, at which an effort will be made to find a basis for an Irish peace settlement.

London, July 14th.—Mr. Eamon De Valera broke the silence he had maintained since his arrival in London, in talking with the correspondents this forenoon. Speaking of his meeting with the Premier he said, this is simply a private conference with Mr. Lloyd George, instead of a long range bombardment, to see what can be done at close quarters. Asked what he considered the conference's prospects for the settlement of peace, Mr. De Valera said, the "outlook is brighter than it ever was in history."
