ST. THOMAS NEWS.

In spite of the fact that there are no penalties attached to the Holiday Ordinance, Holy Thursday and Good Friday were observed in the customary manner, business being entirely suspended.

From the early hours of this morning, there were persistent rumours regarding the safety of Messrs. Bang and Norup, the former of the West India Co. Ltd., and the latter pharmacist of the Apothecary Hall. It appears that these gentlemen left town yesterday morning for Botany Bay in a motor boat. They arrived safely at their destination, went ashore, spent some time with Mr. Holst, the owner of the estate, who happened to be there, and left at about 2 P. M. on the return trip. Failing to get back up to a late hour last night, their friends became alarmed, and early this morning, a search was made, the "Tadousic" finding the motor boat anchored off Fortuna Bay without occupants.

The situation now appeared to be very alarming and search parties were at once organized to scour the district where the boat had been found, and District Chief of Police E. C. Guggenheim in a 50 ft. launch with an expert crew started to explore the numerous islets and cays that abound on the western side of the island, John Brewer's Bay, Esplanade Bay were visited one after the other, but all in vain, and continuing to Fortuna Bay, the Chief discerned a man on a big cliff, waving to him. As the launch approached, the person thus calling for help was seen to be Mr. Norup, who did not hesitate to abandon his forced rocky abode. Mr. Bang was found a couple of minutes later on the shore. The Chief landed his exhausted passengers safely at the W. I. Co's. dock in about one hour afterwards. They explained that the motor failing, they had anchored the boat and swam ashore, and even attempted to come to town by land, but had failed to do so. Their feet had suffered somewhat severely being bruised and scratched by sea eggs and sharp stones.—St. Thomas Bulletin, 18th April.
