ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Feb. 14th.—French official circles keenly appreciate Mr. MacDonald's cordial tone towards France in his speech in the House of Commons on Tuesday and the creation of a healthier atmosphere is bound to be facilitated by the Premier's speech. The authorities here are convinced of the sincerity of Mr. MacDonald's desire for close Franco-British cooperation and determination to appreciate the French point of view and France's special position, as the power deeply interested in the settlement of reparations problem and the question of France's security. Confidence is expressed in official circles that upon the basis of the cordial atmosphere which has now been created, both sides can come to the task of working out a practical solution of the problems that can be carried through in a spirit of mutual understanding and conciliation.

Paris, Feb. 14th.—M. Poincare was to have presided last night at a banquet of the War Veterans Association. He was unable to attend and his speech was read by the Minister of War Maginet. In the course of the speech, after having reviewed the various phases through which the reparation problem was passed, the Premier said. "We today are disposed to profit by the advantages we enjoy and try to come an understanding with our Allies and then with our former enemies. We are convinced we shall find on the part of our Allies loyalty and goodwill equal to our own and we hope to find on the part of the
