The Danish author Charles Gjellerup has, like Rudyard Kipling and Selma Lagerlöf, been awarded the Nobel literary prize. "The mill" is one of Gjellerup's most famous works; Anders de Wahl worked in an office before his parents allowed him to follow his proper calling, the theatre. Warmly interested in his art, and being happily equipped as regards voice, appearance, a lyrical temperament and a strong sense of humour, he has by degrees attained a prominent position amongst present day Swedish actors. He is a scenic realist, who understands making his part genuine, but at the same time without sacrificing the romantic element.

A part which will attract much interest is that of Lizzy—Klara Kjelblad—both on account of the symbol of destruction Karl Gjellerup has given it, and because her face is new to the screen. Miss Kjelblad has hitherto belonged to the ballet at the Opera and has now been discovered by the producer Mr. Brunius, who has great expectations of this fresh, undeniably dazzling and more than promising acquisition for Swedish production.

Ellen Dall is previously known to the cinema public through her charming part in "Norway Lass". She is a Danish actress, who has taken part in several films in her native country. For some time she had an engagement in the company of the celebrated Danish actor Waldemar Psilander. Her specialities are naturalness and simplicity, and in her role of the young girl engaged to the miller, she also appears to be so good and pure, that she, at once, from the very beginning wins the sympathy of the public.

the future stability of the Balkan States as the Bulgarian revolution. Doubt was expressed today in many quarters whether the revolutionary regime would be strong enough to resist the powerfully organized Agrarian party, which numbers among its members a great part of the Bulgarian peasantry. Some observers fear the present episode may lead to civil war. In such an eventuality, they point out, the Bulgarian army would be helpless to cope with the situation as it is merely a police organization of a few thousand men.

Belgrade, June 10th.—The Jugo-Slav Cabinet was called into session immediately the news of the Bulgarian coup d'état became known. The Government regards the revolution as an internal Bulgarian affair, but it feels that it cannot remain indifferent to the situation if the new Bulgarian Government show a dis-

position to disregard Bulgaria's peace obligations.

Paris, June 10th.—The Government has received a message from the new Bulgarian Government giving assurances that it intends to live up to the terms of the peace treaty and all other foreign engagements signed by the Stamboulisky Government.

Berlin, June 11th.—Five civilians were shot dead and one seriously wounded in Dortmund last night, according to semi-official advices. It is not stated who was responsible, although the reports add that troop reinforcements have arrived and occupied the city hall and that more than one hundred persons are under arrest.

Paris, June 11th.—No reply to the recent German note is considered necessary, so far as France is concerned, it was said at the Foreign Office this after-

noon, but if the Allies desire to improve the opportunity to resume a general discussion of the reparations question, France is ready.

London, June 11th.—Lord Curzon had an important conference with the French Ambassador, Count Saint Aulaire, this morning, the Foreign Secretary urging that the French Government accept Berlin's latest reparations proposal as a basis for negotiations. If France will do this, Lord Curzon will inform Germany, it was stated, of the French Government's willingness to discuss the problem collectively with the Allies. Great Britain, it is explained, will then endeavour to obtain from Berlin a pledge of the cancellation of the orders for passive resistance in the Ruhr, which Premier Poincaré has named as a condition precedent to any pour-parlers. If Germany acquiesce in this, steps will be taken to convoke an international conference for the settlement of the whole dispute.

Canton, June 11th.—On three fronts, west, north and east of Canton, battles are raging between Sun Yats constitutionalist forces and Northern Chinese troops. On one of the battle lines Sun's armies are reported to be falling back in the face of greater numbers, while on the third he is barely holding his ground.

London, June 12th.—The match between the touring West Indian cricket team and the Essex XI was continued yesterday at Leyton, the West Indians completing their first innings for a total of 139 runs. Individual scores were as follows: Fernandes 5, Ince 15, Challenor 101, Small 53, Holt 1, Nunes 61, Constantine 0, Browne 14, Pascall 8, Dewhurst (not out) 7, Francis 8, extras 16, total 289. Essex then went in to bat for their second innings and had compiled 142 runs for the loss of seven wickets at the close of the day's play. Scores were O'Connor 35, Trevelyan 17, Spurr 4, Freeman 17, Douglas 52, Carter 0, Moule (not out) 28, Cooper 2, Eastman (not out) 0, extras 7, 142. The match will be continued today.

Kansas City, June 11th.—With at least five persons reported killed, thousands driven from their homes and property damage estimated in the millions of dollars, many districts in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas are flooded today. Torrential rains over Kansas for the last three days caused rivers and small streams to overflow, destroying crops in the lowlands and inundating residential and business sections of several towns.

Oxford, June 7th.—By a score of 4 goals to 3, Syracuse University Lacrosse team today defeated the Oxford University team. The first half brought out fast and keen playing. Each side scored one goal. From this stage, until five minutes before the end of the game, the Oxonians appeared to be the better team. They lead by two goals to one and then three to two. Then the Americans scored twice in succession and won the match.
