

do work upon their peaceful and lawful jobs they will in some way be injured. I will ask you gentlemen to say to your constituents that the Government now offers a reward of twenty-five francs to any person producing evidence that will lead to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons who in any manner threaten or seek to intimidate any other person or to in any way deter or prevent such person from going to and performing his or her daily work or occupation. There shall be no intimidation under the American flag and the Governor will use his full power to quell any such attempt. Every citizen, every man, woman and child shall proceed freely about their lawful occupation and the Governor will see that they are not molested.

This is a period of great depression in business throughout the world and business can survive only if there is entire co-operation between capital and labor. There are thousands of men and women out of work everywhere in the world and in the United States they number into the hundreds of thousands. All the prices in force during the war were inflated and unhealthy. They could not survive the return of peace conditions, so that now both prices and wages are gradually dropping to pre-war figures. This is a very ill-advised time for anyone to strike and my advice to all good citizens is to keep the jobs they have and do their best to rebuild prosperity; and I most solemnly urge upon everyone to observe law and order and carefully refrain from all injury to property.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Brentwood, England, Aug. 23rd.
Philadelphia Pilgrims continuing p.
today in the cricket match begun on Monday with the Essex team, completed their innings for 387 runs. Yesterday the Americans had scored 101 for four wickets. The Americans won the match by an innings and 75 runs. Evans carried his score to 124 runs. He was the first member of the American team to make a century.

London, Aug. 24th.—Over 1,000 lives it is learned, have been lost in the rioting in the Malabar district of British India. Twenty men of the Leinster regiment at Tirunangadire are reported to have been cut off.

Paris, Aug. 26th.—The treaty, by which a state of war between Hungary and the Allies was ended, was promulgated here yesterday.

Washington, Aug. 24th.—President Harding would be requested to invite Great Britain and France to join the United States in a conference at which means for stabilizing international exchange would be discussed, under a bill introduced last night by Chairman Mc Fadden of the house banking and currency committee.

New York, Aug. 26th.—Japan took one step towards the challenge round in the 1921 Davis Cup play emblematic of the world tennis championship, when Shimidzu defeated Anderson of the Australian combination 6-4, 7-5, 6-4 on the courts of the new port tennis association here yesterday. The victory of Shimidzu, while comparatively clean cut was due more to Anderson's errors than to any sparkling tennis on the part of the Japanese player.

Paris, Aug. 25th.—King Constantine of Greece, who has been visiting the battlefield in Asia Minor, is ill from intestinal trouble at Eskishehr, says a despatch received here. He fainted yesterday and was unconscious for 20 minutes, it is said, and he is confined to his room. Greek Doctors have been summoned to Eskishehr from Athens.

Berlin, Aug. 26th.—Mathias Erzberger, former Vice-Premier and Minister of Finance, was murdered today. Herr Erzberger, was assassinated near Offenburg, where he was sojourning with his family. His body contained 12 bullets wounds. Herr Erzberger had left Badgriesbach, where he was taking the cure in company with the Reichstag Deputy Diez for a foot tour of the Black Forest. An hour later both men were confronted by two youths, who separated them and then emptied revolvers into Herr Erzberger, who was killed instantly by shot to the head. Deputy Diez also was wounded.

London, August 26th.—An aeroplane carrying mail from London to Brussels fell into the English Channel a few miles off Calais, France, today, as the result of the explosion of its petrol tank. It is not known if there were any fatalities.

London, Aug. 26th.—Viscount Haig, former Commander-in-Chief of the British armies in France, has succeeded to the chairmanship of the United Service Cantem Fund Committee, following the departure of Lord Byng of Vimy to Canada.

Dublin, Aug. 26th.—The letter of Mr. Lloyd George to Mr. DeValera was received in Dublin late tonight. Its contents came as a surprise to the Sinn Feiners. They had expected further arguments on the claims of Ireland they had raised, instead of a repetition of the essential conditions of the British Government made known to Mr. DeValera at the conference at Downing Street.
