TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 16th.—The following
telegram was sent this evening to Mr.
Lloyd George at Gairloch: "Received
your telegram last night. Surprised you
do not see that if we, on our side, accept-
ed the conference on the basis of your
letter of September seventh, without
making our position clear, Ireland's
representatives would enter the con-
ference with their position misunder-
stood and cause Ireland to be irrepara-
bly prejudiced. Through the correspon-
dence that has taken place you have
defined your government's position. We
have defined ours. If the positions were
not so definitely opposed, there would
indeed be no problem to be discussed. It
should be obvious that, in a case like
ours if there is to be any result the nego-
tiators must meet without prejudice
and untrammelled by any conditions
whatsoever, except those imposed by the
facts as they know them." Up to a
late hour tonight Mr. Lloyd George had
made no response, but the consensus of
opinion was that since neither side to
the argument is desirous of a rupture
in the negotiations, there doubtless will
be a further exchange of messages.

London, Sept. 17th.—Advices from
the Malabar district of India state that
rebel activity in that region is increas-
ing.

Tokio, Sept. 17th.—It is intimated that
Japan may refuse to discuss the Shan-
