Post Office Notice

COMMENCING Saturday, Oct. 23, 1921, this office will be closed on Saturdays at 4 p. m., and the hour for closing the mail for Saint Thomas, Porto Rico and the United States will be extended to 4 p. m., instead of 3 p. m. as at present. This change is occasioned by the fact that owing to the continuous demand for service at the post office windows on Saturdays until 5 p. m., it is practically impossible to divert the necessary attention to closing and dispatching the mail which should reach Frederiksted at a certain hour, and entails considerable time to make up. While general business will be suspended at 4 p. m., the public will gain one hour additional in which to catch the outgoing mail, and it is calculated that this arrangement should redound to mutual advantage for patrons and the service. As regards the mail from Frederiksted, it is so arranged that this will be delivered by 4 p. m. The earnest cooperation of the public is invited in observing the proper hours in which post office service will be given patrons, and it must be enjoined that, while it is sincerely desired to extend the maximum facilities and accommodation to all patrons at all times, demands for service when the office is necessarily closed for the taking up of specific duties, manifestly operate against the efficiency of the service and should be discouraged.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Vienna, Oct. 9th—Wiener Neustadt, one hours ride from Vienna, was under sporadic machinegun fire yesterday from Hungarian insurgents occupying the range of hills Southeast of the city. The insurgents finally were dislodged. Eichbuchel also was sharply attacked and the inhabitants fled into Wiener Neustadt. The situation officially is regarded as more threatening. In Vienna there is excitement over rumours that the Hungarians may attack tonight simultaneously with a monarchist uprising in the city.

Washington, Oct. 9th.—Spring wheat production showed a reduction of almost 13,200,000 bushels, and a corn reduction of 22,800,000 bushels compared with a month ago, the department of Agriculture October crop report yesterday indicated. Potatoes, prospective however, showed an increase of 22,800,000 bushels and tobacco of 43,200,000 pounds.

London, Oct. 8th.—The following are the board of trade figures for September total imports £87,110,000. Exports of British products 55,240,000, pounds. Re-exports 8,590,000, pounds. Total exports 63,830,000 pounds. Excess of imports 23,280,000 pounds.

Toronto, Oct. 10th.—Amid much that is changing and disintegrating, the Salvation Army stands four square against the forces of evil, ever, ready to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and smooth the dying pillow of the outcast and forsaken and to speak the word of life to the dying, said the Major Mary Booth, second daughter of General Booth who was the chief speaker at the farewell meeting yesterday to Commissioner and Mrs. Richards who leave soon for a new field of activity in Australia. The Commissioner preached two sermons during the day. He came from New Zealand to Toronto seven years ago and now returns to Melbourne Australia.

London, Oct. 11th—Viscount Grey addressing a liberal meeting at Berwick, on the Tweed last night, discussed the Irish Conference. "The Irish delegates he said" are not dealing with the Government alone, they are beginning to deal for the first time with public opinion". One danger, he declared was that the Irish representatives might force the negotiations to a point where the people really believed their self-preservation was imperilled. He believed that dominion partnership with Ireland was consistent with the safety of Great Britain provided the naval defence of both countries was under one authority.

London, Oct. 11th Particular significance has been attached to the speech made by Viscount Grey, exminister of Foreign Affairs, at Berwick yesterday, in consequence of it being his first political address made since his retirement in 1916. The speech is regarded as forecasting his return to political life
