As is the custom with the U. S. Marines the world over the Marines stationed at Christiansted St. Croix, began their regular annual summer maneuvers today. The maneuvers this year are expected to extend intermittantly over a period of two or three weeks and will include among other things a hike from Christiansted to Frederiksted along three roads at the same time. One column will march by the North road, one by the center and one by the South road. There will also be sham battles (with dummy cartridges), road sketching, problems in

attack and defense, night marching, tent pitching, problems in advance and rear guard, surprising and attacking an imaginary enemy and many other problems peculiar to the art of war. It is also the intention to bivouac on various parts of the island over night.

The intention of these exercises is to keep alive the lesson learned in the World War and to demonstrate to the public at large the nature of service to expect should the citizens at any future time be called to the colors in the defense of their country in event of another war.

The citizens of St. Croix, are invited to attend any of these exercises.
