Rome, Nov. 26th.—The people of Europe will not have another war, and because the Socialists form a party which always has opposed war, the people of Italy voted for them," said Signor Francesco Nitti, the Premier, in explaining to the correspondent the present Italian situation and the true meaning of the last general elections, when the number of Socialists members of the Chambers of Deputies were more than trebled. He characterized reports in circulation abroad that Italy was on the verge of a revolution as "simply absurd."

Belgrade, Nov. 26th.—A semi-official communication says that significant movement has been noted among the Italians in the northern occupied zone. An Italian Legion has been formed at Sebenico. It is composed of new arrivals of troops with ammunition and other supplies for the Italian Army.

Washington, Nov. 26th. Replying to a farewell message from Mr. Lansing, the Prince of Wales sent a despatch from his ship saying he could not thank this Govt. enough for its kindness and hospitality. "I am greatly touched," the Prince said, "by the kindness of your farewell telegram on behalf of the Govt. of the United States. This visit has been to me a delightful experience, which I shall never forget. I cannot thank the American Nation and the American Govt. enough, for the kindness and hospitality which have been shown me in such a generous measure wherever I have gone. I shall now always think of the people of this country as my friends and I shall look forward keenly to an opportunity of repeating my visit. In his parting message to the Prince, Mr. Lansing expressed the hope that he would carry away memories as agreeable as those left behind him. "Permit me to express on behalf of this Govt.", the Secretary said, "the satisfaction and pleasure which it has been to entertain as its guest, so distinguished a representative of the British Empire, whose brief sojourn in this country has done so much to strengthen the friendship and good-will of the two great English-speaking nations".

Dublin, Nov. 26th.—Widespread suppression of Sinn Feinn and other organizations in Ireland has been ordered by the Govt. The Official Gazette today publishes a proclamation prohibiting and suppressing Sinn Fein organizations, Sinn Fein Clubs, the Irish Volunteers, the Cunnannamarian and the Gaelic League in all counties and boroughs of Ireland.

Paris, Nov. 26th.—Lieutenant Etienne Poulet, the military aviator who left his aeroplane near the City on October 13th on a flight to Melbourne, Australia, left Karachi, India, for Bombay yesterday

morning. Engine trouble developed, however, and he was forced to descend when half the proposed journey was completed.

New York, Nov. 26th.—James Larkin, Irish Labour Leader, and Benjamin Gitlow, former Bronx Assemblyman, were indicted for criminal anarchy today by the extraordinary Grand Jury. The bail of \$15,000 each on which they were recently released, was continued. Indictments on similar charges also were returned against several persons, and bench warrants for their arrests were given to members of the police bomb squad to serve.

New York, Nov. 26th.—The Govt's announcement for fixing a flat general price of 12 cents a pound for sugar was criticized yesterday by George A. Zabuskie, Chairman of the Sugar Equalization Board, who said that without such action a reduction in the price of sugar might be expected. The establishment of a flat rate, he said, would operate to raise the price of all sugar produced in this country, most of which can be manufactured on a ten-cents basis. Cuban producers, he added, would be inspired under the fixed twelve-cent rate to hold their entire output for that price.

Berlin, Nov. 26th.—With reference to the Clemenceau Note, the "Tageblatt" says that once more Premier Clemenceau shows his repellant tone "charged with unquenchable hate." The article concludes with speculation as to whether the Note indicates that the German prisoners will be returned after the formal ratification of the Treaty, or whether it is intended to hold them indefinitely. According to the "Berliner Zeitung" (Amitag), Herr Von Simson who went to Paris as head of the Mission, will not return to the French capital. The new instructions, the newspapers state, are calculated to prove to the Entente that the German Govt. sincerely desires to fulfil its obligations.

Washington, 26th.—A wage advance of 14% for all mine worker's maintenance of Government control over coal prices and no increase in prices at this time, were the conclusions of Administrator Garfield, announced tonight the operators and miners, wage scale committees.

London, Nov. 27th.—Sir Allan Smith, Coalition Unionist, has been returned from South Croydon in the bye-election caused by the resignation of Sir Malcolm, the vote was Sir A. Smith 11,777, Alderman Houlder 9,573.

Mexico City, Nov. 27th.—Declaring there is "no legal foundation or principle of International Law" upon which the United States bases its demands for the immediate release of Mr. Wm. O. Jenkins, United States Consular Agent at Puebla, the Mexican Govt. through M. Hilario Medila, Under-Secretary for Foreign Relations, stated it was impossible to accede to the request of the American State Department. It is asserted

the Executive Department cannot, under Mexican Laws, intervene at this moment in an affair which is strictly in the hands of the State Courts. It is declared that the imprisonment of Mr. Jenkins was neither unjustified nor arbitrary, and that Mr. Jenkins is preventing his own freedom by refusing to give bail for which reason, it is said, he cannot be considered a victim of molestation.

Paris, Nov. 27th.—By the conditions of the Bulgarian Treaty which was signed this morning, Bulgaria is called upon to surrender all works of, and valuables taken from Allied countries during the war; and to pay an indemnity of approximately \$445,000,000. Bulgaria is deprived of Thrace and also loses Strumnitz, a small triangular section of territory, the latter having been assigned to Serbia. Proposals which would give Bulgaria a corridor through the Thracian territory to the Aegean are left to the future dispositions of the Allied Powers. The boundary between Roumania and Bulgaria is absolutely abolished by the treaty terms, the Bulgarian Army being limited to 20,000 men, also a gendarmerie or police force not exceeding 1,000 is allowed. Arms and ammunition exceeding the amounts laid down by the treaty shall be turned over to the Allies. A Commission composed of Allied representatives is given power to punish crimes committed by Bulgaria during the war and also deals with repatriation of prisoners.
