TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Nov. 17th.—Lord Curzon left for Paris today with the object of consulting with M. Poincare concerning the Allied policy to be pursued at Lausanne.

He proposes leaving Paris for Lausanne tomorrow, possibly accompanied by the French Premier, in time to confer with Premier Mussolini on Sunday.

Manila, Nov. 17th.—The American Chamber of Commerce has been urged by the President of the Philippines Senate to operate with the local legislature in its efforts to obtain authority from the United States Congress to call a constitutional convention to evolve the plans for a Philippine Republic.

Constantinople, Nov. 17th.—A Kemalist attempt to get an interned Turkish destroyer out of the Golden Horn, disguised as a merchantman, was frustrated by the Allied patrol.

Elyria, Ohio, Nov. 17th.—The death occurred here last night of Mr. Sharn, former United States Ambassador to France, aged 63.

Washington, Nov. 17th.—Mr. John Bassett Moore has been officially announced as United States representative on the international commission of jurists for the purpose of considering changes in the rules of international law.

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 17th.—A newspaper correspondent, arriving from Huasco, where he explored ruins caused by the recent earthquakes, said that only two houses remained standing. He also reported that due to fright caused by an astronomer's prediction of further earthquakes, twenty six of the populace, living in tents on a hillside, had died suddenly. At Vallenar, he reported the dead as three hundred and that the number would be increased when the ruins were uncovered, also that the decomposition of the corpses was a menace to health. At Copiapo, three more shocks were reported, one of them being very violent.

New York, Nov. 17th.—M. Clemenceau on the steamship "Paris" was met at quarantine by a municipal steamer, aboard which was a delegation consisting of French veterans and well-known personages, among whom were M. Jusserand, the French Ambassador and Colonel House and a reception committee. The procession proceeded up Broadway to the Town Hall, where M. Clemenceau was officially welcomed. After this ceremony he went to apartments which had been placed at his disposal by Mr. Charles Dana Gibson.

Paris, Nov. 17th.—The National Convention of the Radical Party met at Marseilles and adopted an economic programme recommending the international capitalization of the German reparations debt by means of bonds endorsed by the countries forming the League of Nations. The Convention declared itself in favour of free trade between France and the colonies and demanded that vigorous steps be taken against speculators in exchange.
