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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Brussels, April 2nd.—It is understood that the betrothal of the Crown Prince Leopold to Princess Yolanda, eldest daughter of the King and Queen of Italy, will be officially announced in June or July next.

Paris, April 2nd.—In the Chamber of Deputies M. Poincare declared that if Germany should continue recalcitrant regarding the payment of reparation France would resume her entire liberty of action and he added that all Allies were in agreement with France on the point. The chamber loudly applauded the statement.

Rome, April 2nd.—It is announced that the Kings of Spain and Denmark will visit Rome during April or May, as guests of King Victor Emanuel. As in the case of the King of Belgium, King Alphonso will first visit the Vatican.

Bordeaux, April 2nd.—President Millerand has left this port for Morocco on a cruiser.

Berne, April 2nd.—The economic experts from Switzerland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Spain and other Powers who propose to assist at the Genoa Conference will hold three days' conference in this city, commencing on Wednesday, at which they will discuss all matters of interest common to the countries they represent.

Berlin, April 3rd.—The German delegation to the Genoa Conference will probably leave on the eighth instant, headed by the Chancellor Dr. Wirth, unless his presence at Berlin should be found dispensable. The Chief Counsellor of the Delegation will be Dr. Walter Ra-

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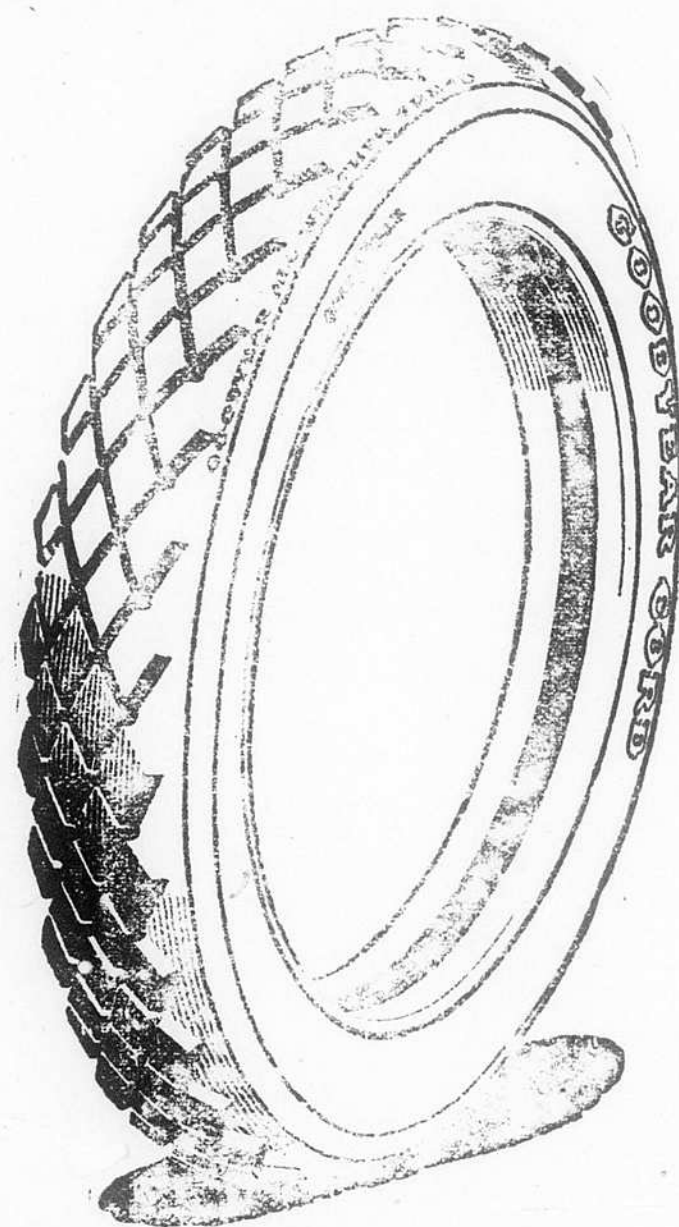
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thenau, Minister for Foreign Affairs and three representatives of the Working Men's Organizations will accompany the delegates.
