1. Colonial Council Bill No. 13.
Continuation of 1st Discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 13, Draft of an Ordinance, introduced by 2nd Appointed Member (Noll), to provide for a re-organization, regulation, and government of the Municipal Police Force of St. Croix.
2. Colonial Council Bill No. 16.
Continuation of Discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 16, Resolution authorizing the Chairman of the Colonial Council to appoint a standing committee of nine members to receive and consider advance copies of a Code of Laws to succeed the present existing laws.

issued by the Post Office Department, Washington, D. C., are now being displayed in the Christiansted Post Office, soliciting sealed proposals which will be received at the office of the Second Assistant Postmaster General until 4.30 p. m., January 20, 1920 for carrying the United States mails, for the term from July 1, 1920 to June 30, 1924 on the following-described routes by the schedules stated, or such other schedules of like running time as the Postmaster General may prescribe, in safe and suitable steamboats or other power boats:

81099 From Charlotte Amalie to Christiansted, 42 miles and back, twice a week.

Leave Charlotte Amalie Tuesday and Friday at 6 p. m.;

Arrive at Christiansted Wednesday and Saturday by 7 a. m.;

Arrive at Charlotte Amalie Friday and Tuesday by 7 a. m.

Bond required with bid, \$1,000. New service.

Note.—If this route be let, no award of service will be made on route No. 81100.

81100 From San Juan, Porto Rico, by Charlotte Amalie to Christiansted, 107 miles and back, twice a week, by a schedule satisfactory to the department.

Bond required with bid \$500.

Note.—If this route be let, no award of service will be made on Nos. 81098 and 81099.

The postmaster advises that route No. 81098 covers service between San Juan, P. R., and Charlotte Amalie, concerning which no advertisement has yet been received. Bidders are cautioned to forward their proposals in time to reach the department by the day and hour named in the advertisement, as bids received after that time *will not be considered* in competition with those received within the prescribed time. Bids should be sent in sealed envelopes, superscribed "Mail Proposals, State of", and addressed to the "Second Assistant Postmaster General, Washington, D. C."
