papers again, there is a distinct hardening of British sentiment in the direction of coercing the Irish people with more force than hitherto has been used. Sentiment, they declared, would approve this based on the feeling that the Govt. has offered very generous concessions, and that the secession of Ireland could not possibly be permitted. Ulster apparently is giving no help to a compromise, and Mr De Valera, it is believed here, must drop any hope of making an arrangement with the northern provinces, whereby they will present a united front with Southern Ireland to Great Britain. Ulster publicists are "standing pat" on the platform of refusing to waive any of that right their new government acquired under the recent Home Rule Act. The general policy of Belfast newspapers and the Orange Societies is not to give soft answer to any of the republicans pretensions, as the Ulstermen term them. Mr. Lloyd George yesterday attended the wedding in Barnsley of Sir William Sutherland, member of parliament, and recently one of the Prime Minister's secretaries, to Miss Fountain who is the owner of coal mines, and one of the richest women in England. After making a congratulatory speech at the wedding breakfast Mr. Lloyd George had conferred upon him the freedom of the Borough of Barnsley. In the speech that followed, he dealt largely with the Irish question, emphasizing that the Irish would be foolish to reject a scheme of self-government beyond the ambitions of historic home rulers. Today Mr. Lloyd George left for a holiday in the Scotch country, forty miles from the railways. Two labour leaders who are friendly to the Irish aspirations, gave their views yesterday. Mr. Arthur Henderson speaking at Carlisle, said the situation was critical, but not hopeless. "An almost insurmountable obstacle is the fact that the Ulster Parliament already has been created" Mr. Thomas, leader of the railwaymen, who is visiting Dublin, said "The atmosphere I see in Ireland is conducive to peace". The outstanding fact in the position of the Irish nego-

tiation is that both Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. De Valera ended their last notes by statements of a desire and willingness to continue the discussion.

London, Aug. 29th.—At the present moment there apparently is no idea that the trouble in India will affect the approaching visit of the Prince of Wales to the Indian Empire. An official list issued tonight contains a number of names of ruling Indian Princes and other personages who will be attached to the suite of the Prince during his visit. Earl Cromer, who once held the post of Aide De Camp to the Viceroy of India, will head the personal staff of the Prince.

London, Aug. 29th.—An Imperial constitution, which would include within its scope the United Kingdom and all British dominions, is necessary, declared Lord Milner, former Colonial Secretary, speaking on Tuesday night at a farewell dinner given in honor of Mr. Massey, the Premier of New Zealand. Lord Milner added that a constitution in some form would become absolutely inevitable. He said it might not be a written document, but that it would certainly be something more tangible than the present agreement.

London, Aug. 29th.—The bodies of Lieutenant Commander Emery Coil (United States Navy) and a rigger, who were killed in the fall of the dirigible ZR 2 at Hull last week, were recovered today during salvage operations on the hull of the airship, according to an announcement made this evening by the Air Ministry. The Air Ministry reports that a considerable portion of the airship has been salvaged.

Geneva, Aug. 29th.—Twenty-eight nations have ratified the International court provided for under the covenant of the League of Nations, thus assuring the permanent establishments of the court. Ninety candidates have been nominated for a judgeship.

GOVERNOR ON LABOR

In a letter to Santiago Igesias, replying to a telegram of greeting from the Federation of Labor Governor Reilly this week expressed himself on the labor question as follows:

"The motives outlined in my inaugural address are advanced with the utmost of consideration for all elements of the individual and commercial life of the Island. My specific reference to labor agitators, a point in question with you, was not directed at those who are sincerely and honestly working for the betterment of labor conditions and the laborers throughout the world.

"On the other hand, I have no sympathy nor place for the man, or organization, whose design is to hide Bolshevism or I. W. W. ism behind the cloak of the good name of labor. I would caution you and your friends against these misguided ones who find shelter and succor among us in every walk of life. The American Federation of Labor is primarily founded upon principles unquestioned in sincerity and fraught with good will toward mankind. As I said in my inaugural address, 'Capital and Labor are hand maidens in the world of affairs and progress, and neither can succeed without the absolute loyalty and confidence of the other.'

"It is this incontrovertible circumstance that should guide us in the consideration of all affairs in which capital and labor may have their differences, and it is this feature we must consider in the mediation of all controversies.

"I extend my sincerest greetings to you and the American Federation of Labor."—Porto Rico Progress, Aug. 19th.
