London, Aug. 13th.—A majority of the morning newspapers approve, either wholly, or in the main, the British note to France and Belgium. "The note is so strong, but not too strong", says the Times. "It was high time such a clear statement of the British case was made". This newspaper adds that the Government put its case regarding the Allied debt with "gratifying firmness", and contends that the taking of separate action by Great Britain would "be the logical result of such a frank expression of policy". The newspaper urges that "if Great Britain is to act, she must act quickly, for her own sake and for the sake of Europe. "The Daily Telegraph describes the note as pro-British from start to finish, adding, "On that account alone the support of a great majority of the English people should rally to the side of the Government". "However", the newspaper regretfully adds "if the phrases which underlined the incompatibility of the French and British standpoints accurately represent the facts, the spirit of mutuality, which made the alliance a strong living thing, animates it no longer we shall have to deal with a sadly changed situation". The Liberal newspapers while recognizing the seriousness of the situation support the note. The Daily News says it was time for the Government to speak out and that, "its frankness is all the more impressive for the unparalleled forbearance it has shown". "Englishmen", adds the newspaper "would never have dreamed of using this tone to France if they had not been absolutely driven to

doing so by France herself." The Westminster Gazette comments, "No other course was consistent with the dignity and interests of this country and we do not regret one word of the justifiable resentment which underlies the earlier sentences of the British reply. We have reached the point where there can be no turning back on our part". The Daily Chronicle asks indignantly why the British position was not made clear long ago, before the Ruhr was occupied, and says that the failure of the Government to display the strength of the British case to the world had been one of its worst faults. France, says this newspaper, has been far ahead of Britain in the arms of publicity, with the results that, "we have nothing like the solid widespread backing from neutrals, especially American opinion to which the moral excellence of our case entitles us". The Independent Daily Express thinks some parts of the note will astonish the public, but approves of the position adopted regarding the debt question. The Morning Post, torn between loyalty to the Government and advocacy of the French cause, is concerned with the gravity of the issues raised, the profound differences between the two Governments and the "dreadful catastrophe to which those differences, if permitted to develop, may some day lead". This paper is convinced that separate action by Great Britain, "will lead only to the abyss". The "Daily Mail" finds the note bad and stupid and says it will make the situation much worse than before.

Paris, Aug. 12th.—The British note is regarded in official circles as a positive disavowal of Great Britain's war Allies and a frank espousal of the German

cause. It is thought that M. Poincare will reply in due time, though at Quai D'Orsay it is held the document smacks so much of propaganda it might properly be ignored. "This amazing document proposes to haul France and Belgium before a tribunal to answer their efforts to make Germany carry out her treaty obligations", said an official of the Foreign Office today. "France and Belgium are not ready to answer such a summons, even from Great Britain."

Dover, Aug. 12th.—Enrique Tirabocchi, Argentine swimmer, landed here at 12.33 o'clock this afternoon, after swimming the English Channel from Cape Griznez, France, 22 and a half miles, in the second record time of 16 hours and 33 minutes.

New York, Aug. 13th.—French francs dropped to the lowest figure in all time and French bonds turned heavy here today, in reflection of weekend political developments in Europe. French francs dropped 12½ points to 555 cents. Department of Seine 7 percent bonds dropped 2 points to 81. Substantial fractional recessions were recorded by French Government 7½ percent and 8 percent and the French municipal issues.

London, Aug. 14th.—Sugar in stock on the 11th inst. was 105,000 tons. Last year 119,000 tons.

Liverpool, Aug. 13th.—Sir Thomas Lipton, before sailing for the United States on the steamer "Cedric", announced that he had definitely decided to challenge for the America's Cup in 1925. He will build a new boat for the race, he said.

Berlin, August 13th.—The new cabinet is constituted as follows. Chancellor, Dr. Gustave Stressemann. Foreign Affairs Herr Von Bergen. Interior Herr Sollmann Socialist. Occupied Areas Fuchs Clerical. Finance Herr Hilferding Socialist. Economics Hans Von Raumer Peoples Party. Reconstruction and Vice-Chancellor Herr Schmidt Socialist. Labour Herr Braune Clerical. Justice Herr Radbruch Socialist. Railway Herr Osse Democrat. Posts and Telegraphs Herr Gilsberts Clerical. Defence Dr. Gessler Democrat. Food Controller Dr. Hans Luther Democrat. Diego Von Bergen is Ambassador to the Vatican. His consent to accept the portfolio of Foreign Minister has not yet been obtained by Dr. Stressemann although it is said he is most likely to do so.

Toronto, Aug. 13th.—Forming a striking feature of "International Year", at the Canadian National Exhibition, is the visit of the Cuban cruiser, "Patria" which will drop anchor off the exhibition grounds during the two weeks of the big fair. Carrying a crew of 130 officers and men, the "Patria" sailed from Havana on Aug. 4th, and will arrive in Toronto Aug. 25th. Aboard the "Patria" is the Cuban Artillery Band of 70 men, who will play at the exhibition during the whole period.
