(Concluded from yesterday's Avis.)

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. It seems to me that there is a misunderstanding some where. With regard to Colonial Council Bill No. 16 I don't see the call on Government to maintain the roads. The reason why the Committee decided to suspend detail argument on Bill No. 14 is on account of the lean year the Government Secretary speaks of and also the present economical condition of the island. We have been talking of good roads for a long time; we are now asking for tools

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for which to work the roads, and we ask that that be paid for out of money in the Treasury not otherwise obligated. When it comes to operation that is another question; we decided that the roller, scarifier and crusher could be operated under the supervision of the Public Works Officer, he being an Engineer the work ought to be more satisfactory if it were done under his supervision. It seems as if the old story which we always heard in the time of Governor Arendrup is coming back again—no funds to fix the roads. —We see that funds are furnished by the Federal Government for making improvements elsewhere, and whenever we ask for funds for making improvements here we are told there is none. Some-time ago we talked about asking Government to take over the center line road, we said then if Government does not see its way clear to do so we would do the best we can. Now we have brought in this bill asking for tools to repair our roads, and when repaired, place it under the supervision of the Public Works Officer. There are certain reconstruction work that must be done on some of the roads. It is true that some of the roads are in fairly good condition, but some are very narrow and in bad condition. If the old Road Ordinance had been lived

up to we would have splendid roads, but it has not been lived up to. The Despatching Secretary has driven over a good many of our roads and I believe he will agree with me that some of them could be widened. The tools should be furnished and the reconstruction made. It seems to me that this request is not unreasonable. As to where the money is to come from, it is to come from the Colonial Treasury, from money not otherwise obligated. I don't see that we should be considered unreasonable. I hope that Government will see its way to grant this request.

Government Secretary (Gaffney) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I welcome the statement of the 4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) because he stuck to the matter under discussion and did not interfere in Government's business on the island. The matter of purchasing a roller, scarifier and stone crusher from funds in the Treasury, not otherwise obligated is all right, but that will entail some additional expense, and Government wants to know about the maintenance which has not been provided for. Again I wish to make it clear that Government is not prepared to maintain the roads of St. Croix.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The amount called for in this bill is for the purchasing of a roller, stone crusher and scarifier and reconstruction will be at public expense. The Public Works Officer can
