

the war. On the coffin plate was inscribed "a British warrior who fell in the great war 1914-1918 for King and Country."

London, Nov. 11th.—An Armistice has been signed between the Armenians and the Turkish Nationalists, it is announced in an Armenian communication dated November 7th received today. The armistice conditions give the Turks possession of the fortress and railway station of Alexandropol and the surrounding districts during the peace negotiations. The Turks, it is stated, guarantee the safety of the inhabitants of the city and the maintenance of order.

London, Nov. 11th.—The girl employee in the office of Sylvia Pankhurst's communistic paper "The Workers Dreadnought" in Fleet Street were thrashed and the offices upset just after eleven o'clock today by an angry crowd. The leaders of the party which raided the office alleged that during the two minutes of solemn silence in honour of the fallen dead as provided for in the armistice day programme, some of the women in the office were singing, dancing and banging tin cans.

Manchester, Nov. 11th.—At a conference today of the International Cotton Committee representatives of England, France, Belgium, Italy, Holland, Spain, Japan and Czechoslovakia submitted points of the trade in their respective countries, showing that the depression is world-wide and "short time" is extensively adopted. Final arrangements were made to send a delegation to the cotton growing districts of Brazil in response to an invitation from the Brazilian Govt. The delegation will start next March and the investigation is expected to occupy five months.

Dublin, Nov. 10th.—Lieut. Col. Le-strange Malone, Liberal member of the House of Commons, was arrested tonight by a staff officer inside Trinity College where he had gone by invitation to speak a debate on Bolshevism at the College Historical Society.

London, November 10th.—The London apartment of Col. Malone was raided by the police yesterday. A search of two hours was made by the policemen, who carried away large bundles of documents alleged to be of a revolutionary character. Col. Malone already had started for Dublin and his arrest there tonight is supposed to be connected with a revolutionary speech he delivered in the Albert Hall, London, on Sunday on the occasion of the anniversary of the Russian revolution. It is known that the speeches delivered by him and others have been under consideration by crown law officers.

London, Nov. 11th.—The House of Commons last night concluded the report stage of the Home Rule for Ireland Bill and the third reading of the measure will take place today. Several amendments to the bill were agreed

to today. These provided that the control of the police shall be transferred to the Irish Parliament three years after the act comes into force and that an absolute majority of the members of each parliament will be requisite to carry a bill for the fusion of the two parliaments. Another amendment accepted makes it the duty of the central council of Ireland to frame a plan for the constitution of the second chambers.

London, November 11th.—Mr. Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons tonight that arrangements had been made to hold a meeting of Prime Ministers of the empire in June 1921. General Pagecroft asked if an undertaking could be given that no decision would be come to regarding such questions as Mesopotamia until the Premiers had met. Mr. Lloyd George replied that such a proceeding would be quite impossible. He said: "The expense after all is not on the Empire but on Great Britain. He also added that the question of holding the Premiers' meeting at Ottawa had been under discussion.

Guatemala City, Nov. 11th.—The congress of municipal representatives of Central America at a meeting at Antigua has proclaimed the advisability of the union of the five states, Salvador, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, and Nicaragua.

London, Nov. 11th.—The Irish Home Rule Bill passed the House of Commons on its third reading tonight, after a motion for rejection of the measure proposed by Mr. Adamson, the opposing leader, had been defeated by 183 to 52. The measure passed without any noteworthy incident in a rather tame debate. The Liberal and Labour members who have boycotted through most of its stages as a sign of their conviction of its hopelessness as a settlement of the Irish problem, were again absent today. The final stage was reached in a small and listless gathering of members of the House.

Copenhagen, November 11th.—Capt. Amundson has sent the following telegram to the Berlingske Tidende from East Cape, Siberia, bearing date of August 14th: "We sailed from home immediately after my wife of August 8th with only three men, as the others claimed wages of 300 pounds sterling monthly. The following day we were held up by pack ice in the Behring Sea. All aboard is well. The foregoing is the first direct message from Capt. Amundson since he set out on his polar expedition from Nome, Alaska, in the ship Maud on August 9th. Five weeks later information reached Nome that the famous explorers' ship had become wedged in the ice 20 miles off Cape Serge, 225 miles northwest of Nome, on the Siberian coast. East Cape, Siberia, the point from which the explorer sent his telegram to the Copenhagen paper, is about

170 miles northwest of Nome and is in the Behring Straits.
